

Man Who Made A Million By Age 30 To Address Christian Women's Club

Mr. Jack Heintz, president of Peace for Israel, Inc., Hollywood, Florida, will be the guest speaker at the annual guest night dinner of the Hornell-Wellsville Christian Womens Club. The event is planned for Monday, October 15, at 7:30 p. m., at Ade Hall, Alfred University. Mr. James Rausch, a well-known Alfred soloist, will sing, and the dinner will be preceded by an antique exhibit arranged by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Hollenbeck of Greenwood, N. Y., who will be on hand to discuss antiques.

Born in Chicago, in 1937, Mr. Heintz is married and the father of four sons. He is a graduate of Northwestern University in Business Administration, and was formerly active in such civic organizations as the Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

At one time Mr. Heintz's major goal in life was to be a millionaire by the age of thirty. Surprisingly enough, he did, via the founding of a rapidly growing and successful truck service and parts distribution company in a suburb of Chicago, of which he became president. However, he states this achievement did not give him the satisfaction he anticipated, and that it was not until 1967 when he changed his whole way of life that he became a happy and fulfilled person. In 1971 he and his co-worker, Howard Barnard, founded Peace for Israel, Inc., whose work will be the subject of his talk. Mr. Heintz's unusual life story was given on "Unshackled", a radio broadcast aired around the world in many languages.

Admission is free for attendance at an unusual movie, "Dry Bones" which Mr. Heintz plans to show at 7 p. m. at the Campus Center, Alfred University. Filmed in color entirely in Israel through the efforts of some of Israel's most talented cinema producers, the narrative is entirely from the prophets of the Old Testament and is narrated by Yossi Yadin, whose father discovered the Dead Sea Scrolls. The musical score was written for the film by one of Israel's outstanding composers, Noam Sheriff, and is played by the Israeli Symphony Orchestra. Previous showings of this film at other universities have drawn much acclaim, and time will be allowed for discussion after the film.

Tickets for the dinner are now on sale at the Cameo Shop in Hornell, at the Fred D. Rice Music House in Wellsville, and at E. W. Crandall & Son in Alfred; or they may be purchased by mail from Mrs. Beverly Limburg, Scio-Belmont Rd., Belmont. Reservations must be made by October 10th.

Land Use Seminar Oct. 16

Belmont, Sept. 24, 1973. The Allegany County Board of Legislators and the Allegany County Cooperative Extension Service have announced plans to hold a Seminar on Land Use at the BOCES Occupational Center in Belmont on Tuesday, October 16. The seminar will be conducted from 5:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. with a buffet dinner served at 5:30 p. m.

The program will consist of three parts, (1) a slide presentation on the impact of express highway development, and on local development patterns in Allegany County; (2) a background discussion on "The Use of Land: Who Decides?"; and (3) a detailed discussion of the various regulatory powers available to guide land use decisions.

The slide presentation will portray the development process in rural areas along Interstate Highway 87 north of Albany. It will also portray development patterns within Allegany County over the past 10 to 15 years; the slide materials are being made available through state and local offices of Cooperative Extension Service. The discussion on "The Use of Land: Who Decides?" will focus upon the overall environmental, as well as the cost implications of land use decisions in situations with and without land use controls.

The discussion of regulatory powers will focus upon six major types of controls: (1) those of the Health and Environmental Conservation Departments, (2) building and housing codes, (3) subdivision regulations, (4) zoning, (5) agricultural districts, (6) the concepts of land trusts and the transfer of development rights.

The program will be assisted by John Snyder of the State Extension Service program at Cornell and representatives of the State Office for Local Government, Office of Planning Services, Department of Environmental Conservation, and the Department of Health as well as local experts. The National Association of Counties in Washington, D. C., is providing documentary materials on the subject of land use.

The seminar is being presented mainly for the benefit of county and local officials and other interested organizations and citizens

LISTEN VETERAN EVER WISH YOU COULD HAVE A SECOND CHANCE? —

If you're a veteran eligible for educational benefits under the current GI Bill then you can finish high school and get that diploma so you will be able to go on to college. Financial assistance may be obtained while you're studying and it won't even be deducted from your eligibility for college assistance. Right now you can get \$220 monthly, and if you have dependents you receive even more.

NEW LEGISLATION Wives and children of totally and permanently disabled service-connected veterans and surviving widows and children of veterans who died as a result of a service-connected disability may be eligible for hospital and medical care under a new law. The legislation, a section of the Veterans Health Care Expansion Act of 1973, became effective on September 1st this year. It is Public Law 93-82. However, if the care is currently available under the medical care program provided for certain dependents of active duty and retired members of the Armed Forces those individuals are precluded from participating in the new program. Individuals who wish detailed information on all medical and hospital benefits available to veterans and their families are urged to visit the local counseling center of the New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville, N. Y., on Tuesdays, and at the City Bldg., 108 Broadway, Hornell on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

Bass Season To Close November 30

Bass fishermen in New York State were reminded today that they still have about two more months of fishing ahead of them this season. Carl Parker, Chief of the Bureau of Fish, Department of Environmental Conservation pointed out an error in the Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide for 1973-74.

A listing on page 21 indicates that the bass season closes on September 30. The correct date is November 30, as it has been in past years, Parker said. The new Guide, a revised and improved version, is now in the hands of all license-issuing agents.

Parker also reminded sportsmen that the license year in New York State runs from October 1 through September 30. Any hunting or fishing conducted after September 30, therefore, requires a 1973-74 license. License fees are the same this year as the previous year, he pointed out.
