A terrible accident happened Saturday morning at the junction of Routes 248 and 17 with three fatalities. There have been several accidents there before, but this is the first one with people killed.

A car from Canisteo apparently failed to stop at the traffic light at the Route 248 intersection. The Eastbound car from Erie, Pa., collided with the Canisteo car. The force of the crash severed the Canisteo car, driven by Mrs. Marilyn McDaniels, just in front of the windshield. Both cars landed off in the ditch. The dead are Mrs. Maroel Birchard, 82 and 7 year old, Sammy McMinds of Canisteo and Delbert Millhiser, driver of the car from Erie, Pa. Mrs. Birchard was pronounced dead on arrival at the St. James Mercy Hospital and Sammy lived until 4:30 p. m. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl McMinds of Canisteo.

Mrs. McDaniels was listed in fair condition at the hospital with broken ribs, chest injuries and multiple bruises. Everette McDaniels, 9, son of Mrs. Marilyn McDaniels, was in good condition with a broken leg. He is scheduled for open heart surgery next week at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester. The Hornell blood bank will need donors for the boy on October 19 from 1 - 7 at the Hornell Masonic Temple.

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held at the school, October 8, 1973. Charles Smith, President, opened the meeting with all Board members and Charles A. Wright, Supervising Principal, in attendance, also present were James Feenaughty and Mrs. Irene Edwards.

The minutes of the last meeting were read. Patricia Higgins made the motion, seconded by John Hunt to approve the minutes as read and place on file. Carried.

The Treasurer's report was presented with a balance of \$63,926.70 in the General Fund, \$1,672.12 in the School Lunch Fund, \$1,748.67 in the Trust and Agency Fund and zero balance in Federal Fund. Ronald Putnam made the motion seconded by John Driscoll to approve the Treasurer's report as presented and place on file. Carried.

A quarterly financial report was presented to each Board member by the clerk, for their review. Patricia Higgins made a motion, seconded by Ronald Putnam, authorizing the Administrator to make the following transfers: Transfer from A730-611 to A050-400 - \$50; A730-611 to A220-398 - \$245; and A730-611 to A291-300 - \$25. Carried.

Ronald Putnam made the motion, seconded by John Driscoll to make payment of claims 124-185 in the General Fund for \$8,697.75 and claims 1-10 in the School Lunch Fund for \$1,770.79. Carried.

Steve McCaffrey, Shelly Dytche and Susie Dennison attended the meeting to discuss Campus Privileges with the Board Members. Susie Dennison read the rules the seniors had set up for them to follow if Campus Privileges were to be allowed. After a discussion between the Board members, Mr. Wright and the three students John Driscoll suggested that they discuss this further with their class and report back at the next meeting. The students discussed it among themselves & decided they would like to try it one month driving to school but not using their car, if Campus Privileges were allowed for Campus Privileges. Ronald Putnam made the following motion: Utilizing the regulations established by the Class of 74, that the Campus Privileges be extended to the senior class until the next Board meeting at which time further action will be taken, seconded by John Hunt. Carried. The Students left the meeting.

Mr. Wright asked for the Board's approval on changing the railing on the front steps from iron to aluminum. Ronald Putnam made the motion, seconded by Patricia Higgins to use aluminum railing in order to cut down on maintenance as much as possible. By a poll of the clerk, Ronald Putnam voted yes, Charles Smith yes, Patricia Higgins yes, John Hunt no, and John Driscoll no.

John Hunt made the following resolution: Resolved, that the President and the Clerk of the Board of Education, be empowered to issue a Capitol note in the amount of \$76,500 for the purpose of financing the building repair project currently in progress and under contract with L. C. Whitford and Steuben Associates. Said note to be payable approximately June 2, 1974. Note to be made in accordance with the Education Law and the local Finance Law. Carried.

Mr. Wright informed the Board that the compactor supplied by Whitford is not the make used in the specifications but meets the specifications. John Driscoll made the motion that we approve the substitution of the Multi-pactor compactor in the place of the pollution packer as described in the specifications, seconded by John Hunt. Carried.

Plans were finalized regarding attendance at the statewide convention. Reservations will be made for Sunday night only for John Hunt, Ronald Putnam and Charles A. Wright.
