Sixth Grade Field Trip

The sixth grade classe of Andover plus about 500 other students from Alfred-Almond, Canaseraga, Richburg, Rushford, Scio, Allentown, Wellsville, Immaculate, Conception School and Whitesville went to BOCES Center in Belmont to attend the first field day of the County. The field trip was set up to make the students aware of the environment.

The students were broken up into groups of twenty-five and thirty receiving instruction in a fifty acre classroom at twelve stations and heard talks and demonstrations.

The first stop was led by Bob McNary, who discussed disposal of waste through a landfill and an incinerator loaned from the Air Preheater. At the end of the 20 minute period a siren blew and the group moved to the second stop where Gary Petrichick discussed land use. He mentioned that land completely developed with buildings and roads may have some of the naturalness of the land still saved. Mr. Hebblethwaite, showed the right and wrong way of farm management. He had models of the poor managed farm and the proper farm. Next were talks from different officers about laws concerning phosphates, dirty smokestacks and DDT. They also demonstrated what they cannot do while fishing, hunting, and trapping. The students also went to a pond to observe pond life and water pollution.

There were many other sessions these sixth graders attended such as outdoor recreation, pollution and different factors of wildlife.

The sixth graders from Andover and the surrounding schools would agree that this was an educational and helpful experience. Maybe these sixth graders will make use of the field trip and "pass on" what they learned and we'll all help in preventing more damage and help clean up our environment.
