Area farmers attending the annual meeting of Agway Inc., Oct. 18 - 19 in Syracuse, N. Y., learned that the cooperative set a sales record of \$667 million in 1972-73, up \$127 million from the previous year.

Ronald N. Goddard, Agway executive vice president and general manager, told some 4,500 farmer-members and guests that earnings also increased substantially to \$15.3 million from \$8.8 million the year before.

Agway Inc., with headquarters in Syracuse, N. Y., is a supply and marketing cooperative owned by 111,000 farmers in 12 northeastern states. It was formed in 1964 by the merger of three regional cooperatives.

Goddard reported that virtually all operating divisions and departments registered substantial sales increases in the 1972-73 business year. Livestock feed volume was up 250,000 tons to a total of 2.3 million tons, he said.

The Agway chief executive noted that Agway now has 111,000 members compared with 85,000 in 1964 when Agway was formed by the merger of three regional farmer cooperatives. Total investment in Agway securities has risen to \$95.4 million from the initial investment of \$49 million by farmers and others, he said.

Also announced at the meeting were Agway's plans to form its own life insurance company. Goddard said the new company will augment other insurance services offered by the cooperative.

Agway currently writes a full line of casualty and property insurance, but relies on other companies for life insurance sold through Agway Insurance Co. representatives, according to Goddard.

The Annual Agway Meeting was at the United Methodist Church Friday night with a Ham Dinner served to 110. Mrs. Gerald Lamphier was dinner chairman. Homer Porter, store manager, was in charge of the business meeting.
