Ways of saving gasoline dominated much of Monday evening's Board meeting. The Board voted to eliminate all late bus runs except Wednesday nights. This will permit participation in Scouting and other activities. This run may also be eliminated in the future if gas savings are not enough to meet the anticipated 15 per cent decrease in supply. All spectator buses for away basketball games are being eliminated except for games at Jasper and Troupsburg. Bus runs to return players and cheerleaders to their homes after games have been eliminated. The return game to non-league Richburg has been eliminated from the schedule. Field trips are restricted to one per class and to ask teachers to make sure each trip is necessary, educational and meaningful. The bus routes of Rodney Creek and Etta Hurd were changed to eliminate double trips over the same route. The Board estimated that these steps will save 800 gallons of gasoline.

Parents and Board members have been informed of steps taken to save energy at the school. Classroom thermostats are regulated so the center of the room is 67 degrees except in non-sedentary rooms such as Chemistry Lab and Agriculture Shop where the temperature will be 65. Gymnasium temperature will be 60 degrees with the stage at 62. Night temperature of 57 degrees will begin at 3 P. M. daily and on week-ends. The large glass window area of the pool section is being insulated with two inches of styrofoam to eliminate heat loss. Water and air temperatures are being regulated to a comfortable range.

Outside lighting is being reduced and shades in all classrooms fully drawn at night. Venetian blinds in the office will remain open because, if anyone broke into the school there would be a better chance that he would be seen if the blinds are left open.

There was discussion on the Senior Class Trip to Washington D. C. and the Board directed that five chaperones accompany the Seniors with the chaperons and bus driver each senior will have \$40.50 for meals and expenses from the Class Treasury.

A school bus will not go up Pinnacle Knob Hill because of safety factors. The Hurd children will have to walk three-tenths of a mile to Route 17 to be picked up by a school bus.

Alvin G. Teribury, 78, was dead on arriving at the St. James Mercy Hospital late Saturday morning. He was as well as usual and took his regular walk downtown. He was taken with a heart attack and fell in the street. The ambulance took him to the hospital.


MEN ARE BETTER QUITTERS THAN WOMEN!

Of female smokers, in the same time, only 25.4 percent had quit.


