## Alleg. Co. Career Development Plans Announced

At a noon Press Conference and Luncheon held Friday, December 14, at the BOCES Center in Belmont, William Farnsworth, District Schools Superintendent for Allegany County, announced that the Allegany County Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) area has been selected by the New York State Education Department to develop a new concept in teacher education.

Using funds from the \$15,000 planning grant made available by the Appalachian Regional Commission, BOCES will coordinate the planning of a Career Development Center.

The major purpose of a Career Development Center is to provide coordinated in-service programs for elementary and secondary school staffs of a particular geographic region.

In addition, the Centers will be designed to provide an alternate route enabling provisionally certified teachers, guidance counselors, administrators, and other school personnel to obtain permanent certification based on competency.

In its position paper describing the Career Development Center concept, the State Education Department states, "individuals familiar with in-service for school personnel recognize that present efforts are by, and in large, ill-conceived, inadequately implemented, poorly financed and rarely assessed to determine their value. This harsh judgement is supported by any number of studies and documents which have been issued over the past several decades."

Improving the current status of in-service education will require a well planned long-range effort. Career Development Centers would make possible the coordination of pre- and in-service teacher training activities, avoiding wasteful duplication.

The coordinator of Phase I is Dr. Walker of Andover, assisted by Betsy Hausman, Earle E. Platt, Division of Teacher Education and Certification, provides liaison with the State Education Department.

The first year of the project designated the planning year (Phase II) includes the identification of participating agencies and the establishment of a Policy Board. Consisting of one representative from each of the participating agencies most directly involved in the project, the Policy Board includes the District Superintendent of Schools, William Farnsworth; Gall Fleschutz, community representative of the County Task Force for Redesign; Preston Lucas, School Boards Association; Nancy McDermott, Teachers Association President; Dr. Peter Glofka, Dean of the School

The Policy Board will approve procedures for assessing staff needs, for setting goals and priorities, and for designing a comprehensive staff development plan. A survey of staff development needs will be conducted early in 1974 and will serve as input to the comprehensive staff development plan. Submission of plans to the State Education Department is scheduled for June 1974, together with a proposal to enable the Center to become financially self-supporting.

Recently issued State guidelines for competency-based teacher education will be incorporated into the Career Development Center. In addition, the Center will serve as a vehicle for encouraging cooperation among schools, colleges and other educational agencies.
