At a noon Press Conference and Luncheon held Friday, December 14, at the BOCES Center in B. Imont, William Farnsworth, District Schools Superintendent for Allegany County, announced that the Allegany County Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) area has been selected by the New York State Education Department to develop a new conpartment to develop a new concept in teacher education.

Using funds from the \$15,000 planning grant made available by the Appalachian Regional Commis-sion, BOCES will coordinate the planning of a Career Development Center.

The major purpose of a Career Development Center is to provide coordinated in-service programs for elementary and secondary school staffs of a particular geographic region.

In addition, the Centers will be designed to provide an alternate route enabling provisionally certified teachers, guidance counselors administrators, and other school personnel to obtain permanent certification based on competency

certification based on competency In its position paper describing the Career Development Center concept, the State Education Department states, "individuals familiar with in-service for senool personnel recognize that present efforts are by, and in large, illemented, poorly financed and rarely assessed to determine their value. This harsh judgement is supported by any number of studies and documents which have been issued over the past several decades."

Improving the current status of

Improving the current status of in-service education will require a well planned long-range effort. Career Deptopment Centers would make possible the coordination of pre- and in-service teacher training activities, avoiding wasteful duplication. duplication.

The coordinator of Phase I is Dr. Walker of Andover, assisted by Betsey Hausman. Earle E. Flatt. Division of Teacher Education and Certification, provides liason with the State Education Department. The first year of the project designates. The planning year (Phase II) includes the identifications of participating agencies and

Phase of participating agencies and the establishment of a Police Board. Consisting of one representative from each of the participating agencies most directly involved in the project, the Police Board includes the District Super-intendent of Schools William Hoard includes the District Super-intendent of Schools William Farnsworth; Gail Fleschutz, com-munity representative of the Coun-try Task Force for Redesign; Pres-ton Lucas. School Boards, Assoc-iation; Nancy McDermott. Teach-ers Association President: Dr Peter Glofka, Dean of the School

of Education, St. Bonaventure University; and Dr. William Walker. Chairman of the Department of Education. Alfred University.

The Po. y Board will approve procedures for assessing staff-needs, for setting goals and priorities, and for designing a comprehensive staff development pin. A survey of staff development needs will be conducted early in 1974 and will serve as imput to the comprehensive staff development plan. Submission of plans to the State Education Department is scheduled for June 1974, together scheduled for June 1974, together with a proposal to enable the Center to become financially self-sup-

Recently issued State guidelines Recently issued State guidelines-for competency-based teacher ed-ucation will be incorporated into-the Career Development Center In addition the Center will serve-as a vehicle for encouraging co-operation among schools, colleges and other educational agencies.
