Two seniors in this year's graduating class have won New York State Regents Scholarships. These seniors are George Burger and David Haugh.

He has been a Varsity Club and a National Honor Society member for three years. In addition to his sports activities he has also participated in many music activities. These include Senior Band, Dance Band, Marching Band, Senior Choir, All-County Choir and Area All-State Choir. This year George is working on advertising for the Yearbook. Besides being active in class plays and Red Cross, he has earned awards in geometry and history. George has plans for a career in law and possibly studying at Cornell.

A recipient of this scholarship is entitled to an award of \$250 to \$1,000 per year, for up to five years of study at any college in New York State. Also, scholarship winners can receive a scholar incentive award of up to \$600 per year. The amount received depends on family income.

The basis on which these scholarships are awarded is according to the score on the Regents Scholarship and College Qualification test. This is a six hour test administered each year, measuring high school achievement and general academic ability.

One of our major efforts over the past few months has borne fruit. Residents of the Village of Andover can now purchase Flood Insurance at subsidized rates, through the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 as amended. This insurance can be purchased through local insurance agencies.

I'd like to again thank Al Winslow, chairman, and other members of the Village Planning Board, Al Barden, Jim Gram, Max Graves, Phil MacMichael, Mary Jane McNeill and Carol Köwley for their successful efforts in preparing the applications which permitted us to be included in the National Flood Insurance Program.

I've had a number of inquiries about the tax rebate on 1972 Village Taxes that the State was to refund. We've been in contact with the State Equalization and Assessment Office. A number of their questions have been clarified and they say they will expedite the remaining paper work.

The State will send the Village one check and we in turn will write checks to the individual taxpayers who have been notified that they have rebates coming. Those of you coming down Rt. 21 at night may have noticed that four street lights are out. These have been turned off to conserve a little energy.

We are anticipating letting bids out on the transformers and other electrical equipment for the new electrical substitution around the end of January.

1974 is here and our Sesqui-Centennial Celebration is in the advance stages of planning with various events about to take place. Why not find out what's happening and how YOU can participate, by attending the Town Meeting Monday night at the school.
