

GREENWOOD NEWS

Jan. 21, 1974 — The Town Board Reorganization Meeting was held Monday night with new Supervisor John Helgeson in charge. Mrs. Marjorie York was appointed Registrar. The Greenwood Office of First State Bank of Canisteo, was designated the Town Bank and the Evening Tribune of Hornell the official paper. The Board officially appointed Franklyn Krusen as Assessor. In other business the Board voted to buy a new 3/4 ton Pickup Truck and a two ton Dump Truck for the Highway Department. The money is available in highway funds for the trucks.

A meeting to reorganize the Greenwood Water Company is being held Tuesday evening, January 22 at the Town Hall for the purpose of electing six new directors. We are suggesting a new rate of users of fifteen (\$15.00) dollars per quarter. This is a raise from eight (\$8) per quarter. There are approximately sixty-five families who are share holders in the Water Company. A representative from each family should attend the meeting. The company is in debt about \$4,000 (four thousand) of which \$1,000 (one thousand) is for a chlorinator and its installation which is state mandated. A \$2,000.00 bank note and \$1,000 for taxes, electricity and maintenance. The system is 65 years old and much repair has been needed.

A review of the \$100,000 repair and renovation project was given the Greenwood Central School Board of Education, Monday night by Custodian, Clinton York. The project which was approved by voters in a special referendum is 50 per cent reimbursable with State Aid. In addition \$8,000 in State Aid was received from the growth aid formula. York said coping repairs had been made and aluminum-sash windows have been installed on some of the windows and others have been caulked to prevent the loss of heat. The front walk and stairs have been repaired, but the handrails are yet to be installed. Rewiring of Exit Lights and an electric booster unit for the hot water tank of the dishwasher are other parts of the project that have been completed. York then gave the Board a list of repairs to be considered in the future as time and funds are available. He said the control of the heating system needs to be renovated, and the clock, bell and public address system needs overhauling. Floors in several parts of the building need recovering and a storage room is needed to house the chairs used in the auditorium, which are now stored in several spots around the building. He said the swimming pool needs a new filter and the pool bottom needs repairing. York also recommended installation of a water softener.

The purchase of a new school bus was discussed. The Board was told that a 60 passenger bus is 10 years old and should be replaced. The Board was also told that a year's lead time is needed for delivery instead of six months and that the base bid for a 60 passenger bus currently is \$11,499.75. The mechanic was directed to prepare specifications for a possible purchase.

The Board voted to continue campus privileges for students for another month. Students Jeff Hunt, Kenneth Malin and Shelly Dyche were present for a review of campus privileges program.

Acting Principal Raymond Duke report on a contingency plan for phase II of the energy crisis and the Board voted to go along with other schools in the District on this. The school is heated by natural gas and so is not faced with the same degree of energy crisis as other schools. The monthly allocation of gasoline is 1459 gallons.

The Board received a letter from Guilford Darles rescinding its price hike and agreeing to the original contract price for the year. The Board voted to permit the new Principal, Gary Moore, who will take over February 1, to hire a replacement for Marianne Wadeck, who has resigned and a substitute will be hired for the first week or two of February. Mary Mullen will be continued as a teacher aide since the need for a physical therapy aide has terminated. The Board approved the

personal leave taken by two teachers for the day immediately after the Christmas vacation.

An in-service workshop on learning disabilities to take place Feb. 5 at the Worldwood Campus in Hornell was announced. Moore was appointed purchasing agent, tax collector and to make cafeteria reports effective February 1.

Attending the meeting in addition to Board members and the three students were Bryan Higgins and James Feenaughty.

The Legislature got right down to work last week, passing major pieces of legislature.

Gov. Wilson signed his first bill as the state's new governor, a measure passed only hours earlier by both houses making a \$100 million loan to New York City to save their 35-cent fare. It passed only after upstate legislators received assurances that they could get similar loans for their areas.

Almost the first bill passed in the Assembly was one making the need for third-party witness in rape cases, a measure that will make women and district attorneys happy. The measure, when it is signed into law, will make it easier for prosecutors to gain convictions in rape cases and hope fully make the streets safer for women.

On the negative side, both houses adopted new rules after much talk about opening up the governmental process to the people. But much of it is sham.

For example, the Assembly agreed to make a transcript available of their proceedings. That is one copy for 18 million people.

Another allows the public to attend committee meetings — but only if the chairman of that par-

ticular committee says so. Which means the doors will be closed when the committee does anything more important than doodle on their note pads.

Last year the Assembly killed a bill — it died in committee — that would have opened state payrolls to public inspection, after it had passed the Senate. It has been introduced in the Senate again this year.

It turns out that reporters, including this columnist, who cover the legislature have been breaking the state's election law for years. Each year the Legislative Correspondents Association puts on a satirical musical comedy and charges \$75 a head. Most of the state's legislators attend. The law says that is illegal. So is any function where candidates for public office buy tickets.

Wilson has ordered special Valentine's Day elections in four places in the state to fill three Assembly and one Senate vacancy. Two are in Queens, one is in Oswego, and the other in Syracuse.

They will cost the taxpayers in excess of \$100,000 to send four new legislators to Albany. And then they will have to run all over again in November.
