Gov. Wilson promised a press conference for capitol reporters and last week he held the first one. He bombed.

It was one of those scenes where reporters gathered in worried little clusters after it was over and asked each other what the "lead" on their stories would be. Something is wrong when the reporters have difficulty figuring out what the most important, newsworthy thing the governor said.

Wilson went into long monologues to answer almost every question, and replied to political queries with worn-out platitudes. It illustrates an old adage: don't hold a press conference unless you have something to say.

All the charges and counter-charges by Republicans and Democrats over Wilson's proposal to change the primary date from June to September may just be so much wind.

Because of litigation involving the lines of Assembly districts in New York City it will be impossible to hold primary elections in

June anyway — since you can't have an election unless the voters know where to vote and for whom they are voting.

Republican Assembly Speaker Perry B. Duryea Jr., stole the show from everyone at the recent Governor's Club dinner in New York City. Hours before the dinner Duryea learned that the election-rigging charges against him had been dismissed by a judge.

After the dismissal, Duryea's lawyers said that while the charges were dismissed on constitutional grounds, they could easily have proved their client innocent had they gone to trial.

Call it an amusing joke, or petty politics, but Duryea claims he still can't find a sponsor for a bill that would raise Atty. Gen. Louis Lefkowitz's salary by \$10,000. Duryea's friends are convinced Lefkowitz could have prevented the indictment of the Speaker.

And of course the whole thing clouds the real issue — why Lefkowitz needs a pay hike anyway.
