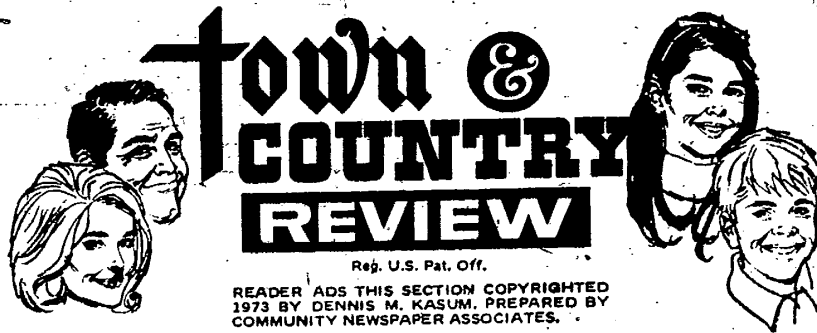

M. in connection with a proposed local law which will require the Allegany County Board of Legislators to cause a special county election to be held not less than sixty days after the adoption of the proposed local law, at a date to be determined by resolution of said Board, on the following proposition: "Shall Allegany county local law intro. no. 4-73, print no. 1, entitled 'A local law authorizing the county of Allegany to join the Western regional off-track betting corporation', be approved?"
