Several requests concerning the Athletic Program were presented to the Greenwood Central School Board of Education by Athletic Director Tom Kumar. The Board approved the participation by three boys in a wrestling tournament at Hammondsport on the recommendation of Mr. Kumar. The school does not have an organized wrestling team.

The Board approved the purchase of 12 new basketball uniforms at a total cost of \$350. The new uniforms will replace present ones which are five years old. Kumar asked for a replacement of wall mats at an estimated cost of \$200 saying that such replacement would protect players, students and the District in case of an accident. The Board said it would look into the cost of such a purchase, means of funding and make a decision at the March meeting.

Kumar told the Board that some boys who take part in basketball, soccer and baseball, have about \$35 invested in footwear since the players must purchase this. The Board said if he knew of any hardship cases he should bring them to the Board's attention and some financial assistance might be arranged.

Shelley Dytche and Jeff Hunt were present to request continuation of senior privileges. The Board voted to grant these privileges to the end of the school year at the discretion of the Supervising Principal.

A vote of appreciation was given to Raymond Duke, who served as Acting Principal between the time of Charles Wright's resignation and when Gary Moore assumed his duties as Principal.

The Board voted to participate in cooperative bidding for paper products and bread and bread products.

A maternity leave of absence from March 25 to July 1 was granted to Sue Phillips.

There was a discussion of the price of Yearbooks, which will be \$10 a copy this year. The District subsidizes the cost so that the student cost is \$5. There was some thought to selling advertisements to help defray costs, but the Board decided to continue a subsidy program.

Mr. Moore reported on the architect's review of the building renovation and remodeling project. Several things need correction and will be remedied he said.

The Board is considering a larger storage tank than the 550 gallon gasoline tank. Daily consumption of gas is 55 to 60 gallons and is about equal to that of last year at the same time.

The Greenwood Town Board Monday night, awarded bids for the purchase of two pieces of Highway Equipment. The low bid for a three-quarter ton pick-up truck was \$3,331, submitted by Elsenheimer Chevrolet Company of Hornell. The 1966 truck will be traded in. The low bid for a dump truck to be added to the Highway Fleet, was submitted by Blovsky Motor Sales, Inc., of Hornell, at \$6,762.72 and was accepted pending acceptable delivery date. Bids for both trucks were also received from Thompson Ford Co., of Bath; A. L. Blades and Sons of Hornell; and Whelpley Implement Co., of Wellsville. Ed Mullen, Town Supt. of Highways, recently hired William Schwartz.
