Virginia is of Crow Indian descent. She has known much poverty and hardships. Her parents were unable to support their family, and, finally, the father left. Virginia's mother was distraught when she could not provide adequately for her children.

Through the sponsorship plan of the Christian Children's Fund, the Andover Presbyterians contribute \$12 a month toward Virginia's support. Their efforts help provide her with food, clothing and school supplies.

"Through better education, we hope she will have a better life," Mrs. York said.

The Andover women contribute voluntarily to Virginia's support.

One member of the group corresponds with Virginia and has received her photograph and personal history. In addition, the group is kept up-to-date on her progress.

"We've noticed progress in the school reports sent to us by the mission school," Mrs. York said. Virginia is not the only one who has benefitted from the Andover group's involvement. "We have satisfaction in helping an individual," Mrs. York said. "We know exactly where our money is going."

"It is a rewarding experience." The Christian Children's Fund, with headquarters in Richmond, Va., helps needy children in 60 countries.
