Now! Big Thing No. 2! — HISTORY:

In answer to the question most frequently asked — your history need not be detailed. Perhaps something like this:

Jake Jacobs, born 6/16/1846, left England and settled for a short time in Maine in 1863. He moved on to New York State, near the Binghamton area, where he married Bedella Bunday in 4/17/1869. Four years later, Jake and Bedella and two young sons, Jonathan and George arrived in Andover to live with and care for an elderly cousin, named Pulda Draperon. The death of Pulda in March, 1874, left Jake Jacobs owner of the farm where we now find the Industrial Complex.

Son Jonathan married and moved to Colorado. Two daughters were born after the family arrived in Andover. Sara now Mrs. Kenneth Koots, aged 85, lives with her granddaughter, Nancy and family in Nashville, Tennessee. The second daughter, Alice, died at the age of three.

Only son George remained in Andover. He married Norma Niblefoot, July 21, 1897. There were six children in this family —

- Richard — W. Palm Beach
- Mollie — Mrs. Willie Wonder — Wellsville

Kate — married Tom Toddering while they were both serving time (magazine, of course) and they are the present managers of the Industrial Complex where they reside in the Bell Tower with their triplets, Bing, Bang and Bong.

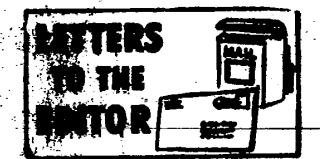

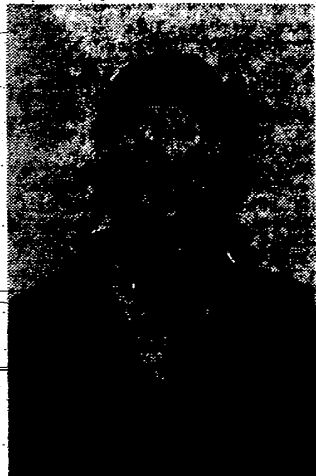

Curville R. Jordan Appointed District Principal

At a special meeting held on February 18, the Andover Board of Education appointed Curville R. Jordan of South Glens Falls to the position of District Principal, effective April 8.

Mr. Jordan is 36 years of age, married, and has four children, ages 2 - 8. He is a graduate of Keene State College, Keene, New Hampshire, where he also received his master's degree in 1963. He has done additional graduate work at Dartmouth, Syracuse, Albany, Oneonta and Oswego.

The new principal has twelve years of experience in public education. He has taught both English and social studies in New Hampshire and New York. He served three years as Supervisor of Social Studies in the Pulaski, New York school district. His administrative experience includes service as a high school principal and administrative assistant in the New Berlin Central School District. Mr. Jordan comes to Andover from the position of Director, Career Education Programs for Washington, Warren, Saratoga, Fulton and Montgomery counties in which there are eight pilot schools in the program.

Mr. Jordan's interests include music, golf, fishing, camping and bicycling. He is a bibliophile and has an extensive collection of books.

Mr. Jordan will purchase a house in the Andover district. Meanwhile, he will rent temporary quarters for himself, bringing his family to Andover at the end of the school year.

The search for a new district principal extended to half a dozen states over a period of three months. The Andover Board of Education received 76 applicants for the position.

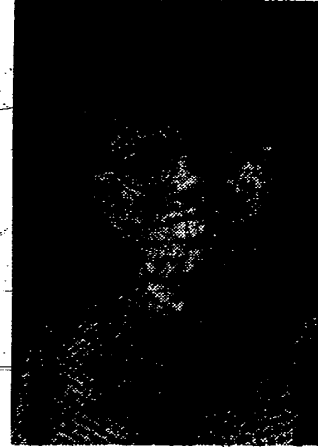

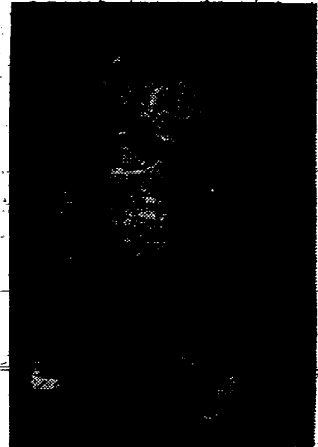

The Mayor's Column

It seems that the oft mentioned dam on Dyke Creek east of Andover, is advancing in its planning stage. Within a week or two people from the Soil Conservation Department are going to make a more intensive feasibility study of that area. It seems that this dam has high priority with our County Board of Legislators and Southern Tier Region West.

The Federal Government has recently made some significant changes in its National Flood Insurance Program.

By 1975 the Federal Government will require that anyone in a flood area such as Andover, who is making application for Federal assistance through F.H.A., G. I. Mortgages, Small Business Administration and etc., must carry flood insurance. It was through the foresightedness of our Village Board that Andover has been accepted into the National Flood Insurance Program. If we had not done so before Dec. 31, 1973, the requirements would have been more complex. We also might not have been approved before the 1975 requirements took effect. This would have prevented people in Andover from obtaining any financial assistance from the Federal Government.

The Village Planning Board has already proven it usefulness.
