## Legislator Lee Ryan Reports

One of the discussions that has been in the foreground recently has been whether Allegany County should join the "Western Regional Off Track Betting Corporation." Our Board of Legislators passed the resolution some time ago to participate but on a very close vote. Since that time, there have been sufficient petitions filed against it, making it necessary to go to a public referendum.

The question has been whether to have a special election or wait until our regular elections in November. Legislation favoring a special election, if passed, will be held May 7th of this year. Those favoring have the main argument that by waiting until next November, we are losing revenues that would more than make up for the extra cost (\$7000). Legislators against say that any proposition on the ballot on our regular election day would attract more voters than would turn out at a special election, besides the extra expense of holding the special election. By the time you read this, we will have the answer when the election will be held as a resolution on this will have been presented at our regular meeting February 25.

My own thoughts on the off track betting have been negative, even though I fully realize that anyone wishing to place bets at the track have and will continue to do so through his local bookie or connection, thus beating the County out of much needed revenue and still leaving it in the hands of organized gambling.

But at issue is a greater concern to me. The agreement states that any county participating would have a minimum of two betting parlors located within its boundaries. Now at the present time, I do not think Allegany County has a large percentage of its citizens spending their paychecks on gambling, but with the betting parlors it seems to me we are saying, advertising and beckoning our people to participate in a pastime that does nothing to add to our moral standards.

As to the cost of the special election, reported to be roughly seven thousand dollars, the Towns would be required to spend the amounts necessary to cover the expense of having voting machines inspected and to pay for election inspectors which would impose a burden on our towns in view of the fact that this money has not been budgeted.

At the Allegany County Planning Board Meeting in February assistant planner Robert McNary and County sanitarian Conrad Kruger gave a very impressive survey of the "Wetlands of Allegany County," with special emphasis on the area known as "Keaney Swamp" in the Town of Birdsell.

They gave a detailed report on the resource characteristics and illustrated with slides the different resources of this watershed — wildlife, vegetation, transportation, sewage disposal, soil types etc. Also mentioned was the type of development that could best be supported. They categorized this as increased recreational and agricultural.

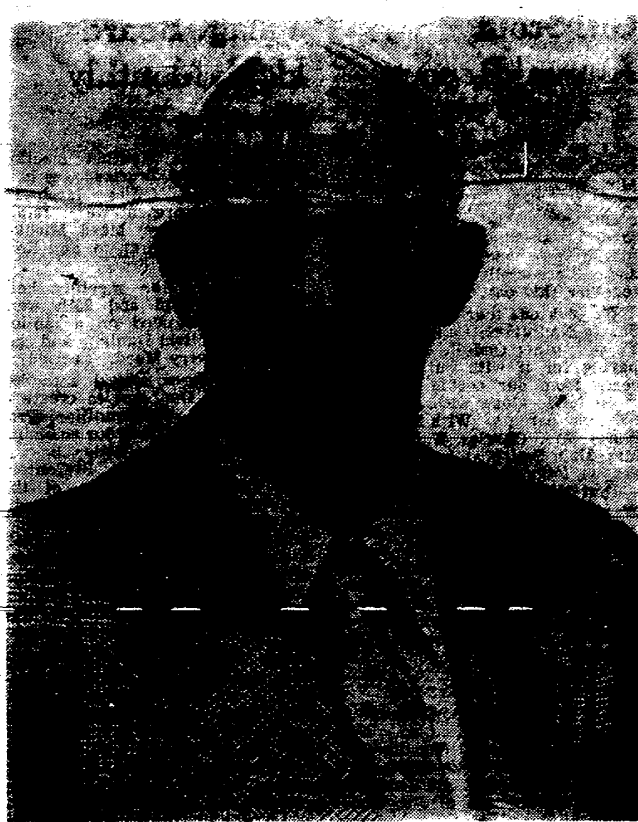
This area is more sparsely settled now than it was years ago and contains many varied forms of wildlife. For quite a few years it has been the subject for discussion by the County Legislature for some sort of development but nothing so far has managed to get off the ground.

## James R. Haugh Retires From Columbia Gas Co.

James R. "Jim" Haugh of Andover, chief station engineer at Columbia Gas Transmission Corporation's South Greenwood Compressor Station near Greenwood, N. Y., will retire April 1, 1974, with over 30 years of service.

Haugh joined the gas company in 1944 as a station engineer at Dundee Compressor Station in Schuylar County, New York. He worked there in that capacity and as a supervising engineer until 1963, when he transferred to South Greenwood Compressor. He assumed his present position in 1971. He had eight years of natural gas transmission experience before joining Columbia. One of his special assignments for the company was conducting first aid training classes for Company employees.

Mr. Haugh is a member and

trustee of the Andover Baptist Church; has been active in the Dundee Masonic Lodge, serving as Master in 1949 before coming to Andover, and still remains affiliated with that lodge. He is a member of the Corning Consistory, A.A.S.R., Valley of Corning, and is a Past "Most Wise Master" of the "Rose Croix" Degree; Past President of the Allegany County Scottish Rites Association, and currently a trustee of that body. He is also a member of the Crystal Valley Grange at Dundee and was Master of that Grange in 1954.

"Jim" has been a member of the Andover Volunteer Fire Department for the last 10 years and as an accredited first aid instructor, was instrumental in organizing the Andover Rescue Squad to which he still belongs.

Mr. Haugh married the former Winifred Brown of Corsica, Pa., and the couple are parents of two sons, James E. who is an electronic Engineer with General Railroad Signal Company of Rochester; David, a Senior in Andover Central School; and a daughter, Brenda, a Sophomore also at Andover.
