Our Troop is active in many areas as we like learning and exploring new and different areas, and we accomplished a great deal together this past year.

We took one tour on a chartered bus to Nantucket, Long Island, N. Y., with other Cadette Girl Scouts paying for it with our own proceeds from our cookie sales and troop funds along with some help from our parents. With Mrs. Jesse Shaw, Mrs. Charles Wallace, and Mrs. Dale Smith as our trip leaders, we found the trip a lot of fun — but there were just too many events crowded into one week-end.

We camped in tents all week and cooked out, enjoying the beautiful weather all day, but had to put up with rain and thunderstorms at night.

One evening we attended a theatre production of "Wait Until Dark" and then we returned to camp to sleep out with the wind blowing around 50 miles per hour — but not one of our tents blew down.

We went to the Jones Memorial Hospital for two different weeks and learned to make beds, take temperatures and pulses, and took a tour of the Hospital. There was a great deal to learn in order to earn this badge with Mrs. Judy Grant, Mrs. Shaw and Mrs. Smith acting as our counselors.

At Christmas time we sold home made rock candy made by Mrs. Schweigart for our Troop project. Recently, we camped out over night at the Alfred Rod & Gun Club with Mrs. Shaw and Mrs. Kenneth Ordway as our leaders. At the present time we are going to four different homes. Mrs. Glover, Mrs. Joanne Clair, Mrs. Shirley Briggs, and Mrs. Irene Burton, to work on our textile badge with these ladies teaching us how to embroider. We purchased embroidery hoops and linen out of our Troop funds for each member and transferred our own patterns.

For the rest of the year we will be getting outside as soon as the weather warms up for more camping and we would like to work on pottery, aviation and swimming badges.

Our Troop received permission to use the School Pool once a month and we are trying to learn life-saving in the water.

For our trip this summer we would like to visit the St. Lawrence Seaway and Locks for a long week-end but haven't voted on any other trip so far because of the gasoline shortage.
