The Greenwood Central School Board of Education Monday night discussed policy guidelines, use of the swimming pool area for other than swimming, assistance with the track program at school and several items purchased. Guidelines were set for the use of garage facilities by the Greenwood Fire Co. to service its equipment. New Principal, Gary Moore was given clarification on the use of school facilities.

There was discussion of a performing arts program that could be presented through BOCES. This involves a group of artists from New York City who would give five performances during the school year for a total cost of \$3,300. There would be some aid for the expenditure. The board directed Mr. Moore to investigate the program before any decision was made.

The Board approved the appointment of Mrs. Juanita Prelos of Alfred as choral music and art teacher to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Marianne Wadeck. Mrs. Pulos was given a five year probationary appointment. Mrs. Ann Kumar will accept the advisor of the cheerleaders responsibility subject to the approval of the Greenwood Teachers Association.

Coach Kumar was present and asked for assistance with the Spring sports program. There are 35 boys signed up for track and baseball. There are 11 freshmen and 3 eighth graders and an assistant would make it possible for the younger boys to be given coaching. There are also four girls who signed up for girls track. It was suggested that someone in the community might be interested in helping with the Spring program and should contact the school. An appointment would be made with the approval of the Board of Education and Teachers Association.

The Board discussed repairs to the pool and, noted it had been inspected by the Health Department Officers. The Board discussed ways of using the pool area to good advantage on days when it is not used for swimming. At present there are two days each week when the pool is not used. Mats are being placed on the floor and a portion of the pool area is used for gymnastics when the pool is not in use. The Board voted to purchase padded mats to be attached to the wall at the end of the gymnasium from the Laux Sporting Goods of Buffalo at a cost of \$700. The Board approved the purchase of a 2000 gallon tank for gasoline storage and a pump from the Hornell Tank and Pump Co. at a cost including installation of \$1630. The order will be placed and the expenditure will be included in the 1974-75 school year budget. The present 500 gallon gasoline tank will be retained for storage purposes.

The Board announced that there is a vacancy for the office of Tax Collector and Census enumerator and applications are to be sent to Mr. Moore. The school newsletter was discussed and plans made for wider distribution so that all tax payers would receive it. Transfer of funds and the borrowing of \$35000 in anticipation of State Aid was approved. The Board met in executive session with the school attorney Edward Dugan on the Woodworth case.
