A fire that was reported started from an unattended wood burning sap evaporator, destroyed a sugar house and caused extensive damage to an adjacent farm shop owned by Carl Sekoll on his farm at the intersection of Banks Hollow Road and Route 17 on the Jasper Road. The alarm was turned in at 3:45 p. m. Thursday by Bill Vanderhoeft, a neighbor, who saw flames shooting from the roof of the sugar house. Fifteen Greenwood Firemen under the direction of Bryan Higgins, responded with a tanker and pumper and were at the scene for more than an hour.

Sekoll, who is a dairy farmer, said he had been boiling maple sap all night and was tired. He had gone into the house to rest. Much of his maple equipment, as well as all the sap he had collected in the last 24 hours and the syrup being made were destroyed. An adjacent small barn used for a farm shop was badly charred by the fire. Also many of the tools were damaged. Sekoll estimated his loss at about \$6,000. He said he had so far this season made 200 gallons of syrup and it was not damaged.
