The Greenwood Central School Board met last Monday night and made several appointments. Scott Kickbush was named Track Coach. He is a member of the Faculty, teaching Music. Ann Kumar was named Cheerleading Coach. She is the wife of a Faculty member and the appointment was made with the approval of the Greenwood Faculty Association. The Board made the temporary appointment of Mrs. Daisy Terbury as Tax Collector until the reorganization session following the District Annual Meeting. The position was held by the late Eloise Holt.

The Annual Meeting has been scheduled for June 11 and the Board set voting hours from noon until 8 P. M., on the budget and Board Membership. Petitions for School Board Membership are due May 28. The seat now held by Ronald Putnam is up for election. Glenn Stephens was named to drive the School Bus for the Senior Class Trip to Washington, D. C. The Seniors left Monday and will return Friday. The chaperons are Mrs. Nancy Wright, Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Higgins and Glenn Stephens.

The Board voted to permit use of the pool on a three-day a week basis for six weeks during the summer by Troupsburg Central School District. The Board voted to raise the fee for the use of the pool from \$200 to \$250.

Principal Gary Moore told the Board that the changes in the minimum wage law would add about \$3,000 to District costs. The District hires several students after school, summers and during vacations for cleaning and maintenance chores who will be affected by the increase in minimum wages. The budget of the Board of Cooperative Educational Services and costs to the District were discussed. Mr. Moore told the Board the District will make its last payment on the BOCES building project before the end of the school year.

The Board set 7:30 p. m., April 24 for a tour of the school facilities to determine what repairs and replacements are needed and to establish priorities for the work.

Mr. Moore reported on the Klepak Report Survey in which the District participated. Forty schools in the State were asked questions about their entire insurance programs. A report from the State Sanitarian was received concerning inspection made at the school. The report said, "the overall sanitary conditions were found to be good". Most of the suggestions have been taken care of he said. The Board decided that it was not interested in supporting a group of schools from Long Island that is seeking to have the present system of State Aid for schools declared unconstitutional. Mr. Moore

reported that he had written State Legislators concerning the need for more State Aid and received standard answers. The Board decided to pass until it can be determined how the Governor's Task Force recommendations will affect the District before adopting a resolution from the Board for a change in State Aid.

The Board adopted the 1974-75 school calendar but will determine the dates for Thanksgiving recess when it learns when the first day of deer season will be.

United Speedways Schedule Opening

Although the month of April has been unseasonably cold, United Speedway Associates, Inc., is hopeful of conducting its practice and opening dates on time. Practice day at Holland International Speedway has been scheduled for Sunday, April 21st from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. The first night of racing at Holland is scheduled for Saturday April 27th at 7:30 p. m. In the event of inclement weather the practice day will be moved up until Sunday, April 28th from 1 to 5 p. m., with opening date slated for May 4th.

Practice session will be open to all four divisions of Late Model Sportsman, Limited Sportsman, Chargers and the newly formed Challenger Divisions. Pre-entry forms have indicated a large turn out in the popular divisions. The practice session will start at 1:00 p. m., with time trials taken throughout the day. At 4 p. m., the 6 fastest Limited Sportsman will then compete in a ten lap race with the winner and second place finisher qualifying for the pole inside and pole outside positions for the first feature event to be held on the opening Saturday. At 4:30 p. m., a similar race will be run for the 6 fastest Late Model Sportsman with the winners receiving similar starting positions in the opening program.

A new Holland starting time of 7:30 p. m., has been established. The 1/2 hour earlier starting time will permit more racing during daylight hours thus lessening the need for lights. This is in accord with the previous announced plans of the Speedway to conserve energy. Practice at Holland on the opening day will start at 6:15 p. m.

Perry Motor Speedway has scheduled to practice on April 28th from 1 to 5 p. m. with opening day on Sunday, May 5th at 2:30 p. m. In the event of inclement weather, practice will then be moved to Sunday, May 12th and opening day slated for May 12th.

The new Challenger Division has been formed to increase interest in auto racing at the local level. The class is purely stock with automatic transmissions required. As soon as the class develops, figure eight racing will then be innovated at Perry Motor Speedway with a cross-over in the middle. This type of racing has proven very popular in other areas of the country and promoter, Ed Serwacki believes this will add greatly to the Perry race program.

Season passes are available for both speedways at the United Speedway Office at 2 North Main, Holland New York. Season pass is a 25% discount off the regular admission for the projected race season.
