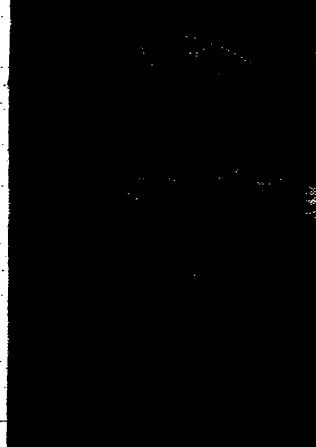

C & M A Church To Feature Kids Crusade

The Andover Christian and Missionary Alliance Church will present a special program feature during the coming week. Pastor Stephen B. Clark announced that the church is planning a week-long "KIDS KRUSADE" with the Rev. Charles C. Olenhouse. These special meetings will begin Sunday, April 28 1974, through Friday, May 3, 1974.

"Uncle Charlie," as he is known to the children with whom he effectively works, has a vast background of experience with children. His kind voice and gentle mannerisms draw children to the meetings where he has been, since his entrance in full-time children's evangelism work. Just eighteen months ago we, at the C&MA Church, were privileged to have Uncle Charlie, and all of his friends that travel with him, for a highly-enthusiastic week of meetings.

Mr. Olenhouse began his ministry as a pastor in 1943, here in Andover, after graduating from the Nyack Missionary Institute. In 1947, he was commissioned to go as a missionary to the Dyacks in West Borneo, (Irian Jaya) where they served for one-term. Upon returning, he ministered in various churches. Due to circumstances he was unable to return to the field as a missionary; so he returned to pastoral ministry, from time to time, speaking in youth conferences and children's crusades.

His messages are appealing to children. He holds their attention with dramatic stories, sound films, object lessons, upside-down drawings, puppets and missionary stories, all with a Bible-centered message.

On Sunday morning the Rev. Olenhouse will be sharing with the Sunday School at 10:00 a. m., and then also bringing the morning message in the Morning Worship Service. All are invited.

On Sunday evening, we will have a special "Children's Rally" with Uncle Charlie leading the children in a parade down Rochambeau Ave., with flags and banners to interest others in attending the meetings. Children should meet at the church at 6:30 p. m., ready to march. Each evening the services will begin at 6:00 p. m. All are welcome to attend.
