Finger Lakes Regional Travel Guide Available

The '74 edition of the Finger Lakes Travel Guide has been completely revised and expanded to 192 pages including several new pages. This latest version features a picture of Dave Harbour admiring a prize lake trout. Harbour is the Sports Afield contributing editor who spent several weeks in the region last summer. Two smaller photographs on the cover highlight fall and winter activities.

The Finger Lakes Travel Guide is the annual publication edited by the Finger Lakes Association covering practically everything there is to see and do throughout the 14 lake country counties of west/central New York State.

Among the items included for the first time is a page on over 50 historical points of interest and a special chart capsuling specific data on more than 2 dozen airports. There is also a tinted photograph of the Finger Lake Region taken by the earth resource technology satellite from 568 miles in space. All 11 lakes are clearly visible as are the region's other water resources including the canals.

The official guidebook includes information on more than 150 communities and some 1,300 special listings on facilities throughout the region such as hotels, motels, restaurants, campsites, antique shops, service stations, retail stores, marinas, gift shops and a variety of other services. The calendar of events, a regular feature has been expanded to include over 220 activities which take place in the Finger Lakes Region throughout its four seasons.

There are 40 pages of strictly editorial material completely updated and including information or regional museums, historical home tours, amusement parks; summer theatres, scenic cruises, hiking boat launching, golfing, hunting, fishing, skiing, snowmobiling, and racing. There is a list of 60 parks including those operated by the State. Charts show the facilities available at each. Other items of special interest include scenic vantage points, industrial tours and a picture and the location of 18 free information centers operated by Counties and Chambers throughout the summer months. There is also a list of the region's 27 colleges and universities which have a total enrollment of more than 100,000 students.

The special 16-page full color center section has also been revised for '74 and includes over 50 color photographs showing the area's top attractions, outstanding events and a variety of activities. The Association's new regional waterways and roadmap is included in this same section.

The Finger Lakes Region encompasses approximately 10,000 square miles, including 650 miles of shoreline. It lies between Rochester and Syracuse and extends north from the Pennsylvania border all the way to Lake Ontario. The six major lakes are: Canandaigua, Keuka, Seneca, Cayuga, Owasco and Skaneateles. The smaller ones include: Conesus, Hemlock, Canadice, Honeoye and Otisco. Other water resources include the Erie, or Barge Canal, Lake Ontario, Seneca-Cayuga Canal, Sodus Bay and a series of other lakes such as — Waneta, Lamoka, Cayuta, Salubria, Cross, Onondaga, Loon and Demmon.

Other changes in the Travel Guide are designed to make it more attractive and easier to use and include the tinting of black and white photographs as well as a similar process to emphasize one column introductory material.

It is anticipated that because of the energy crisis, the tourist hand book will be more popular than ever this year. The Finger Lakes Association has already received more than 10,000 requests for the new book. The Finger Lakes Travel Guide, which is being printed in 62,000 copies is available for 75c from the Finger Lakes Association 309 Lake Street, Penn Yan, N. Y. 14527.

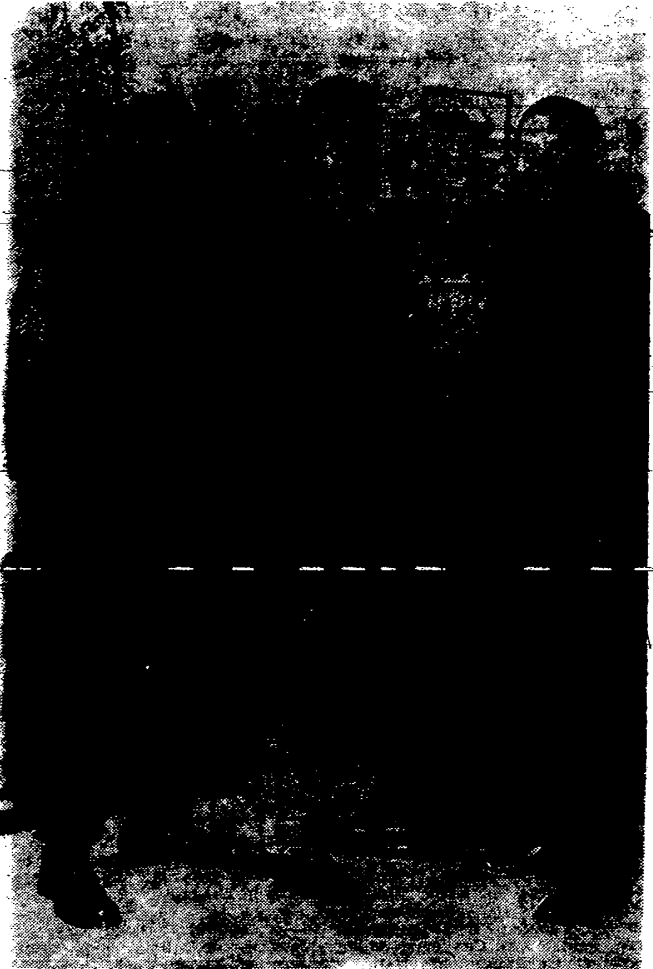

Andover Student on Championship Canisius College Rifle Team

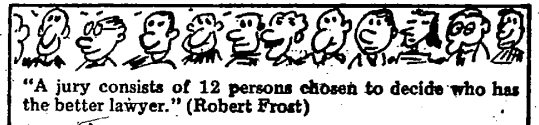
