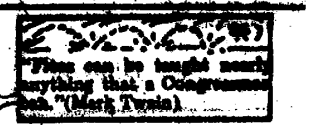
Mrs. Mildred Burd opened her summer home at Ellisburg, Pa., at Easter and is spending week-ends there.
