On Friday, May 10th at 12:30, the 3rd grade of Greenwood Central School had a Mother's Day Luncheon. Each child wrote an invitation to their Mother to attend. If Mother couldn't come a substitution could be made.

Mothers replied to the invitations and these notes were put on the bulletin board. Place mats were made by the children.

Each child had a certain job to do for the luncheon. While some prepared the food, others served. The menu was as follows:

Following the luncheon, the children entertained with dancing folk dances, Ach Ya, Alley Cat, Pop Goes The Weasel with Don Halladay calling and the Virginia Reel with Marc Warriner calling.

Besides the Mother's Day Luncheon, the children had a Grandmother's Day earlier in the year. Grandmothers came and spent the day, doing the required work right along with the children.

Other activities the children do are: Make cranberry relish, ice cream and butter, Tap trees and make syrup, hatch eggs and put on a Minstrel Show.

The children are also required to make a leaf collection, a stone collection and a flower collection. A shadow box depicting Thanksgiving and a Scrap Book of ten pictures and an explanation of each picture on some topic of the children's choice.

During the mid-term the children are treated to a Swim & Pizza Party.

Third grade also boasts an aquarium. Each year we visit the Fish Store and make purchases of additional fish. New this year are the Habetal Trails. In one set we have gerbels and the other a mouse. We also have a hamster.

The parents are kept informed about third grade activities by a weekly letter which is sent home each Friday. The children make an artistic cover and a few of their papers are sent home in this booklet.
