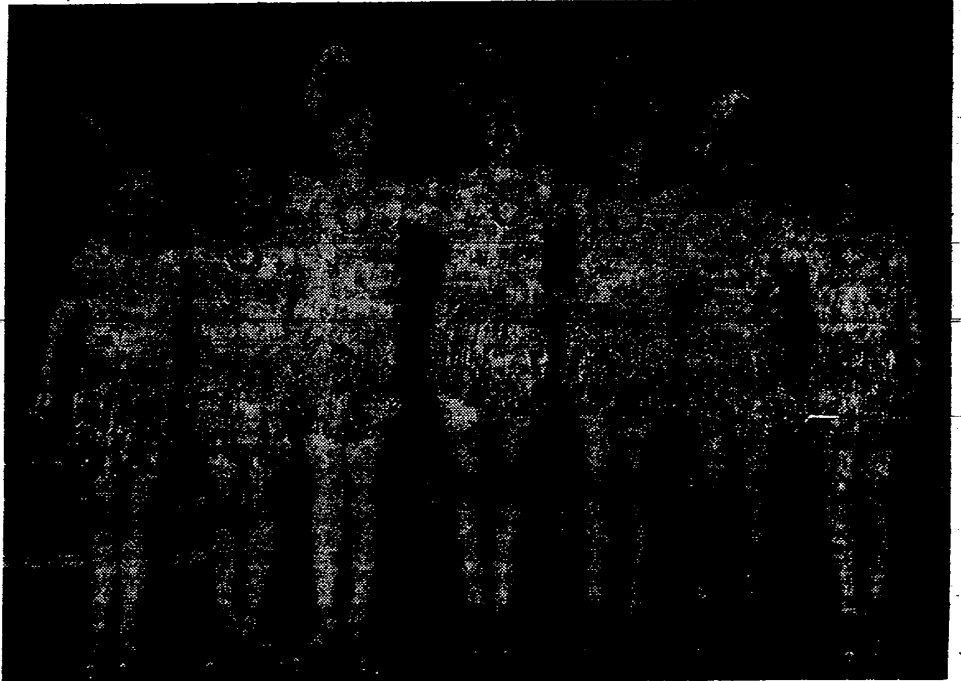

Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office May 13, 1974 at 7:30. Those present: James Bliss, Mayor; Paul Hyland, Avery Mead, Michael Brace and Robert Baker, Trustees; William Argenti, Attorney; Gabe Karolyi, Engineer and Robert Costello, Electric Supt.

Minutes of the special meeting held April 30, 1974 were read and approved on a motion made by Avery Mead and seconded by Paul Hyland. Carried.

Bids were opened on a sander as advertised. Hanna and Hamilton Inc., of Bath, New York was low bidder at \$3220.00, and Chautauqua Pipe & Tank Inc., of Portland submitted a bid of \$3,639. These bids were tabled for further study until the next meeting.

A discussion of flood insurance on Village Buildings and property was held and was tabled for further investigation.

Moved by Robert Baker and seconded by Michael Brace, to accept, with regret, the resignation of Phil MacMichael from the Village Planning Board. The Board wishes to thank Phil for his contribution in helping to organize, and for the progress that has been made by the Planning Board. Carried.

Moved by Robert Baker and seconded by Michael Brace, to authorize Mayor Bliss to attend a Conference of Mayors meeting to be held at the Concord in June. Carried.

A request for building permits from Bruce Lehman and Stephen Lewis was tabled for further discussion with Mayor Bliss.

A request was received from the C.M.&A. Church for permission to hold services in Legion Park. As this Park does not belong to the Village this request will be referred to the American Legion.

Moved by Michael Brace and seconded by Avery Mead to enroll Mrs. Barbara Walker in the New York State Retirement System as of June 1st. Carried.

Moved by Robert Baker and seconded by Avery Mead to send a Village Employee to the Water Treatment School to be held in Syracuse in June. Carried.

Moved by Robert Baker, and seconded by Michael Brace to pay half of the expense for Officer Belmont to attend Police school

in Montour Falls. 1/2 to be paid in May and the rest at the completion of school in June. This is not to exceed \$100. Carried.

John O. Baker and Carol B. Dodge representing Allegany Video Cable T.V., was present at the meeting. Moved by Paul Hyland and seconded by Avery Mead, to receive a petition and resolve to conduct a public hearing on a rate increase. Carried.

The following resolution was offered by Paul Hyland who moved its adoption, seconded by Avery Mead.

A resolution authorizing the issuance of \$100,000 serial bonds of the Village of Andover, Allegany County, New York to pay the cost of the acquisition and installation of additional Substation Equipment in the Electre Distribution System of the Village of Andover. (Full resolution attached to minutes of meeting and published in the Andover News May 16, 1974) Carried.

Avery Mead offered the following resolution, seconded by Paul Hyland who moved its adoption and it was duly carried unanimously.

WHEREAS a motion has been made that the Village of Andover join with the Town of Andover and the Andover Central School District for a summer youth project.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Village of Andover make application to the New York State Division for youth for approval of this recreation project and a refund of 50% of all monies spent on said project and The Mayor be authorized to sign all necessary papers of application. This resolution adopted by the following votes. Polled: Avery Mead - Aye, Paul Hyland - Aye, Michael Brace - Aye, Robert Baker - Aye and James Bliss - Aye. Carried.

The veteran Clark who has won many championships in the past, is defending his 1973 Holland International Speedway Championship while attempting to dethrone Dick Flaig of Eggertsville as the current Champion of Perry Motor Speedway.

To date, the Late Model Sportsman division has provided unparalleled competition with any one of many drivers being competitive enough to win the big money. Outstanding performances to date include Richie Wrobel of Elma; Phil Edwards of Buffalo; Stroker McGurk of North Collins and Gail Barber of Bliss, New York.

In the Limited Sportsman Division Lockport Policeman Charlie Newman leads the overall point standings with a feature victory at Perry and a second finish at Holland. Newman, who has been racing for many years, is attempting to win his first championship.

Racing competition continues at the two popular Speedways with Holland International Speedway running each Saturday night starting at 7:30 and with Perry Motor Speedway running on Sunday afternoons starting at 2:30.
