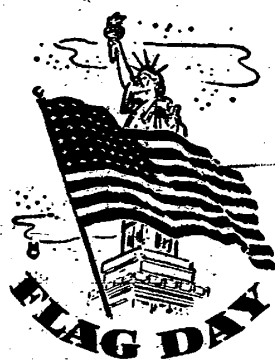

I want to thank Mike Brace for writing this column last week. Citizen participation is a must if the Village Government is going to reflect the wishes of the residents of Andover.

In attending the annual meeting of the Conference of Mayors I was able to talk with representatives of a number of state and federal agencies to see what kinds of projects or funds might be available for Andover. One of the sessions I attended dealt with municipal electric departments. In comparison to most other municipalities having an electric or light department, we contribute a minimal amount to our general fund. The chance to talk to Mayors and representatives of other municipalities about common problems and different solutions attempted made the conference worth while.

As you may know the Joyce Hotel has been sold to the Rural Management Association of Allegany County who run the Andover Medical Center. They will be advertising for bids to demolish the hotel within a week or so.

Littering on Main Street remains a problem. With the new trash receptacles furnished by the Andover Lions Club, there is no excuse for using the sidewalks and gutters to dispose of used cans, bottles or papers.

There has been a rash of window breaking particularly in buildings not occupied all the time. Parents, you wouldn't stand to have your children break your own windows, why allow them to break other windows.

Again I'd like to remind anyone intending to build a new structure set up a mobile home (house trailer) or remodel an existing one — that they must get a building permit first.
