About twenty-five people atlend ed the hearing on the proposed budget at Greenwood Central School, Tuesday night. The budget of \$649.918.72 was presented by Supervising Principal Gary Moore with assistance from the Moore with assistance from the School Board

Two questions were asked and most of them were on State Aid Moore said that State Aid Forms will not be available until August and only rough estimates can be made now. He asked the group for answers to the question (What direction should the school system take? He reviewed some areas that re considered needing

We desperately need a music room and an Art room and more storage space. He also cited the need for expanding the Library facilities to make better use of the equipment and materials the school has, pointing out that only 22 stu-dents can use the Library at one time. More important is the need for more offerings for aigh school students.

Library. They divided themselves in eight groups some with three members and some with four. Each group selected a country of the world to study. Four groups selected television documentary style to present the material they learned about France, the British Isles India and Africa. The other four used large displays to present their information on the Soviet Union, Germany, Southeast Asia and Afgentina. Union, Germa and Argentina.

The boys and girls worked in the media center to look up information in encyclopedias and other reference books. They selected pictures to use in their presentation. They prepared individual reports, maps and posters. The haste thrust of each project report was the history of the country. hasic thrust of each project report was the history of the country. Mrs. Anr Zuschin, teaches the Feurth. Fifth and Sixth Grade Social Studies classes and has the Sixth Grade for her classroom. The Fourth Grade was invited to visit the Sixth Grade classroom to hear the reports and to view the displays. Mrs. Zuschin introduced each group.

The children learned to evaluate statements they found in texts as fact, inference or value judgement.

fact, inference or value judgement. The reports gave many of them a chance to gain confidence in public speaking. By sharing their project results they made the rest of the class aware of the history of many parts of the world.

Mrs. Zuschin said this has been a new approach. The children worked in groups and decided for themselves what they wanted to accomplish and who should do what. The results have been very rewarding and Mrs. Zuschin said she had been busier then every giving advice and offering suggiving advice and offering sug-gestions when asked. It will help the children on preparing reports and using reference materials in higher grades.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the following Local Law No. 5 of 1974 which became effective May 24, 1974, is published pursu-and to Section 214 (2) of the County Law:

A local law to supersede the provisions of subdivision six of section two hundred fifteen of the county law in their of the county law in their application to county real property

property

Be it enacted by the board of legislators of the county of Allegany as follows:

Section 1. Nothwithstanding the provisions of subdivision six of Section two hundred fifteen of the County Law, real property now or hereafter owned by the County of Allegany, or any portion thereof, may be sold or leased to private persons or comporations, without advertising or competitive bidding, upon such terms and conditions and in such manner as may be determined by resolution of the Board of Legislators of Allegany County.

§ 2. This local law subject to permissive referendum shall take effect on the date it is filled in the office of the Secretary of State or hereafter owned by the County

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN 111AT the following Local Law No. 6 of 1974 which became effective May 24 1974, is published pursuant to Section 214 (2) of the County Law:

A local law to provide payment of an annual sum to certain county officers and employees after twenty-five years of continuous full-time county employment

Be it enacted by the board of legislators of the county of Allegany as follows:

Section 1. All county officers and employees, except those employees covered under any agreement as a result of negotiations. ment as a result of negotiations under the Public Employees Fair Employment Act of the State of New York, who have completed or shall complete twenty-five or more years of entities only full time course. years of continuous full-time county employment on or after the effective date of this local law and remain in a full-time continuous employment status, shall annually receive the sum of \$250.00 in such manner and at such time as the County Board of Legislators shall prescribe by resolution. The aforesaid sum shall be in addition to any sum now or hereafter received by such officers and employees pursuant to local law number one of nineteen hundred and seventeto. years of continuous full-time coun-

§ 2. This local law subject tos 2. Inis local law subject to a permissive referendum shall take effect on the date it is filed in the office of the Secretary of State.
