The Montagnois Camp in the Laurentides Park, operated by the Province of Quebec, remains a favorite brook trout spot of mine, and when you combine the good fishing with the excellent accommodations and a wilderness experience, it truly is a fisherman's paradise.

So there we are. Clif Thorne Larry Murray, Joel Tomkins and I were sitting on the shore of Little Lake Metascouac surrounded with magnificent scenery and sharing our solitude with moose, trying to figure out how to catch brook trout under near flood conditions. The lake, one of a multitude available to Montagnais fishermen, was up four, maybe five feet. The only bright idea from our guides was to wait for the water to go down.

We fished the two inlets, and the outlet, and the bays, and the points to little avail. You always seem to be able to pick up a few breakfast trout in these waters, but the hot action we had anticipated just was not there. The first evening at Little Lake Metascouac revealed no rises during a calm period just at dark — a sure sign that the fishing was going to be tough.

As we sat there listening to the cries of some romantic loons, it was obvious that the fish had plenty of food — perhaps an abundance never before known to them — and were not in their usual haunts. The lake has a marshy grassy shoreline in many areas, and all of this was flooded. We guessed

the trout might be "grazing" in these pastures that were usually unavailable to them.

The next morning we started hitting these flooded grasslands, and we started picking up trout nearly stuffed to the gills with a wide assortment of grubs, insects and other critters. And some of the trout were nice ones — none of the four pounders that have made this lake a favorite of Montagnais anglers, but some respectable brookies up to nearly two pounds. Flies and streamers were never really effective under these conditions — you had to get the trout's attention with flashy spoons and spinners. We needed something that would work with a fast retrieve, or else we would get hung up in the grass. The key to our success was Dardevles' new Cop-E-Cat Skamp in the fluorescent orange and green finishes. We caught more fish, and bigger fish on these than any other lure, and it sort of saved the day for us.

Any trip to Quebec's Laurentides is a good trip, and when you can catch a decent creel of speckie, it becomes a memorable experience. And this is the way our gang felt about it as we loaded up for the trip home. The biggest question on your mind at a time like that is how soon you can get back.

**Christian Mattison Goes To Scotland**

On June 23 1974 Christian Mattison, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Reid Mattison, will journey from Montreal, Canada to London, England to Inverness, Scotland where he will be met by Mr. Eric Hilton, professor at Alfred University. From Inverness, Mr. Hilton will take Chris and two other students travelling with him to Tongue, Southerland County where a total of six students will be taking a summer school course entitled "Photography and Drawing in Scotland" from Mr. Hilton. During the six weeks in Scotland the group will travel to the Orkney and Hebrides Islands as well as traveling inland by van.

While staying in Tongue, on the Northern Coast, the students will be living with farm families. Almost every day the group will participate in seminars, discussing the impressions of the sea scapes and land scapes of Scotland upon the individual. A total of eight undergraduate credits will be granted to the students upon completion of a portfolio and other criteria of the course.

Chris hopes to attend Salem College at Salem, West Virginia in the fall of 1975. The course he is interested in American Heritage Arts, which specializes in preserving the arts, crafts and architecture of early America.

This trip to Scotland is a long awaited dream and this experience is looked forward to with joy and great expectation.
