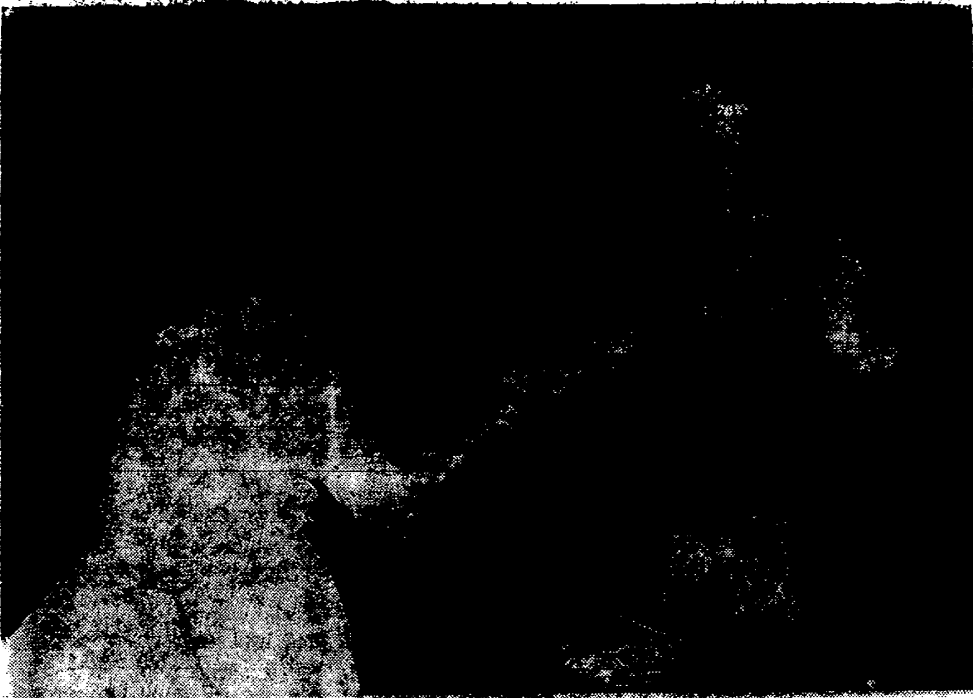

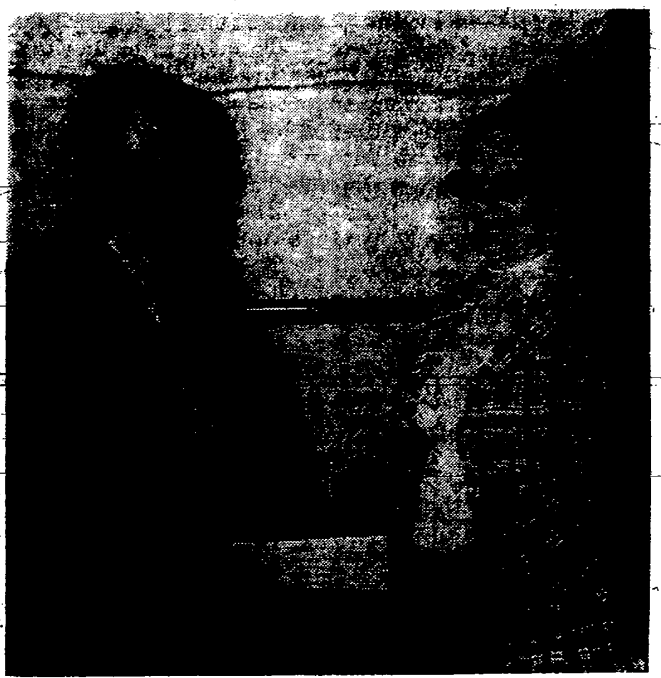

The morning program started out with the bath tub races shortly after 9 a. m. which must have been hilarious and are covered under Brothers-of-the-Brush News; followed by the Crowning of the Queen, Betty Jackson, about 9:45; with the Parade getting underway shortly after 10 a. m.

Leading the parade was the local Police Car, followed by the Rescue Squad Ambulance and Andover Fire Truck with Ralph (Red) Allen and his wife, Jeanne Backus Allen as Parade Marshalls. In the lead convertible driven by Eugene (Pal) Pfuntner accompanied by Assemblyman James L. Emery; followed by Village and Town Officials and the Queen — all in convertibles.

Immediately following the hour-long parade, a Flag and Flag Pole Dedication Ceremony was held sponsored by the Andover Lions Club. Lions Club President Leon McNell presented the flagpole and Clyde Yorton, Commander of the Lynch-Burgett Post No. 397 The American Legion, presented the American Flag to Mayor James Bliss.

Master of Ceremonies Michael Bruce of the Andover Lions Club led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, followed by a rendition of the Star Spangled Banner played by the Andover Central School Band under the Leadership of Joseph Canale; and then a reading of (The Flag Goes By) by Tim Mead, President of the newly formed Leo's Club.
