

PLANNING A VACATION TRIP? An Editorial

Stopping along the highway to enjoy the scenery on your vacation is much more fun if the halt is your idea and not the car's. If your summer vacation will be taken via the family car make sure it receives a thorough safety check before you start packing it with summer clothes, sports equipment and kids. And a stalled car is not the only hazard — a breakdown on a highspeed expressway while in motion could be both frightening and extremely dangerous.

As a vacationer, you can save yourself a great deal of aggravation if you make a few basic safety checks and take a few precautions before starting your trip. If your car's present road performance, idle or starting ability is less than satisfactory, have an experienced mechanic service the car completely, and be sure he checks the safety equipment especially. A tune-up now can save inconvenience and additional expense — and maybe your life — when you get your vacation on the road.

In particular, we recommend having the following items serviced:

Tires. Make sure the tread is not dangerously worn, and that the inflation is at the recommended level — and be sure to make the same check on the spare tire.

Steering system should operate easily, but not too loosely.

Brakes should take hold evenly, without tugging the car to either side, and the brake pedal should not have too much play before braking action starts.

Hoses and belts should be checked for proper tightness and condition. Loose hose connections and overly slack belts should be adjusted, and worn one replaced.

Exhaust system should be free of leaks, for efficiency of operation, minimal noise, and safety—exhaust gases seeping into a car can cause drowsiness and death.

All lights headlights, dashboard lights and brake and signal lights, should be operating perfectly.

Worn wipers should be replaced and window-washing unit should be filled. Both should function without sticking or clogging or any sluggishness at all.

Front end alignment should be checked, for strain less steering and no uneven and dangerous wear away of the front tires.

All fluid levels should be checked water, oil battery, transmission, differential, power steering and master brake cylinder.

It may seem irksome to take all that time and trouble before your trip — but nowhere near as irksome as encountering a stoppage of your vacation for costly repairs after you set out on the road. Take the time now to freshen up your car. The few extra hours of maintenance will provide peace of mind throughout the trip, and spare you the misfortune of ruining your family's vacation.

And, Don't Forget Your Home!

Coming home to a burglarized home is no way to end a vacation. Take a few precautions to insure that everything will be the way you left it when you return.

Before you leave, be sure to:

Tell a neighbor where to reach you in an emergency. Give him an itinerary of your trip, so in an emergency, he can contact you by calling the highway patrol or leaving a message at your destination.

Give your neighbor a spare key and ask him to check your house daily.

Arrange to have your lawn mowed, your houseplants watered and your pets tended.

Stop newspapers, milk, and other regular deliveries.

Notify the local police or sheriff's office so officers can keep an eye on your house.

If you'll take these steps to safeguard your home, you'll be less likely to have your vacation spirits dampened by a burglary.
