Army Offers New Training and Bonus Enlistment Option

Headquarters of the Department of the Army announced on 1 June 1974, that a \$2500 and \$1500 bonus is being paid to qualified men and women, with or without prior service, who enlist in the Army for four years, and who possess or are awarded certain specified military occupational specialties.

To qualify, enlistees must have a high school diploma or a certified GED certificate and obtain passing scores on entrance examinations.

Some of the bonus paying fields are construction Machinery Operators, Electronic Repairman, Map Draftsman, Inventory Clerks, and several others. The bonus will be paid in a lump sum upon completion of training. (In most cases 16 weeks). Twenty percent of the bonus will be withheld for federal tax.

Applicants may also be eligible to enter the Army's Delayed Entry Program (DEP) depending on the school for which they enlist.

The DEP program is designed to permit an individual to enlist in the Army, and have up to 270 days before reporting for active duty. This program better enables an enlistee to obtain the military school of his choice. Most schools are open to women.

Studded Tires? Read This!

Citing recent instances of violations, State Transportation Commissioner Raymond T. Schuler today advised that studded tires are illegal on vehicles that use State highways during the period May 1 through October 15.

Commissioner Schuler said, "Though studded snow tires add to driving safety during certain snowy and icy road conditions, research has shown they may well contribute to accidents on dry or rain-wet pavements."

The Commissioner pointed out that studs increase pavement wear and therefore, maintenance and resurfacing costs. This wear is greatest when pavements are clear of snow and ice.

He urged all drivers to obey the May - October 15 rule for no studded tires and to avoid being found guilty of a traffic infraction with a possible penalty of a \$50 fine or 15 days imprisonment.

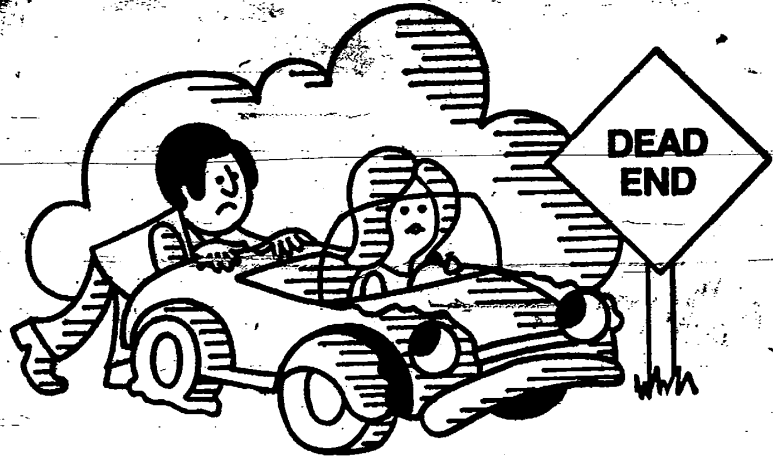
