The Board of Education has advertised a public hearing at the school, Thursday, August 8, at 8 p. m. Your support and vote is urged to allow the excess funds to be used as follows - Proposition number 1 - Resolved that the Board of Education of Greenwood Central School District is hereby authorized and directed to set aside the sum of \$10,000.00 in the General Fund of 1974-75 budget for the purpose of reducing taxes and an additional sum of \$28,000.00 in the building reserve fund for the purposes of repairing and remodeling of the school building.

Proposition number 2 - Resolved that the Board of Education of Greenwood Central School District is hereby authorized and directed to set aside the sum of \$2,000.00 in the Reserve Fund for the bus garage building of Greenwood Central School District. Reserve funds to be used to replace roof and install a grease rack. Said sum to be set aside is from the excess funds in the 1973-74 School District budget.
