

Small Game Limits and Regulations Announced

New York's small game hunters learned details of this season's regulations and bag limits. The Department of Environmental Conservation's announcement indicated that most seasons are substantially the same as last year, although there have been several liberalizations that will interest hunters.

Spring turkey hunters will be permitted to hunt from sunrise until noon, an extra two hours per day. Another help during the spring season will be that all hunting boundaries will be roads so that boundaries will be easier to locate.

Another change is that varying hare now may be hunted with dogs during the regular big game season in three Adirondack Counties — Clinton, Essex and Franklin.

Turkey hunters will have to apply for special free permits both for the fall and spring hunts as in past years. This year, however, permits will include tags which will have to be affixed to the turkey immediately upon its being taken.

Another restriction listed this year in the Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide closes the hen pheasant season in Dutchess County. The guide also indicates as a change that hen pheasants may not be taken in Rensselaer County. But hens have been protected there for a number of years, so this is not new.

License fees remain the same this year, but the Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide for 1974-75 has been improved. Two significant changes include complete lists of all environmental conservation officers and their telephone numbers. This will enable sportsmen to cooperate more closely with the Department in reporting any violations they see.

Another improvement in the guide is the expanded sunrise sunset tables. Times are now listed from September through May covering the earliest fall season for woodcock, right through the spring turkey season.

Hunting hours remain generally from sunrise to sunset. These shooting hours also apply to woodcock, even though it is a migratory bird. For other migratory birds, such as ducks and geese, shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Although the \$5 Federal duck stamp is not required when hunting woodcock, gallinules, rail or snipe, the shotgun must be plugged to hold not more than three shells. This is the same restriction that applies when hunting ducks and geese. Dates for the waterfowl season will be announced by the Federal government in late August.

Hunters are advised to refer to the 1974-75 Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide for specific reference to season, bag limit and area descriptions. The guide will be available at license-issuing agents when licenses go on sale in mid-August. The license year in New York runs from October 1 through September 30. General information on season dates and bag limits follow:

October 21 - November 17 — rest of upstate — 2 per day.

October 1 - February 28 — in counties where pheasant season opens October 1 — 8 per day.

Varying Hare (Snowshoe Rabbit)

October 1 - March 16 — in Clinton, Essex, Franklin, Fulton, Hamilton, Jefferson, Lewis, St. Lawrence, Warren and Washington Counties as well as Northern Zone part of Saratoga County — 3 per day.

October 21 - March 16 — in Herkimer, Oneida and Oswego Counties — 3 per day.

December 15 - February 28 — in Delaware, Greene, Rensselaer, Sullivan and Ulster Counties as well as parts of Orange, Otsego and Schoharie Counties (see Guide) — 3 per day.

December 15 - 31 — Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua and Steuben Counties — 2 per day.

January 1 - February 28 — in Chenango, Cortland and Madison Counties, as well as parts of Broome and Onondaga Counties (See Guide) — 2 per day.

February 1 - 28 — in Albany, Columbia and Montgomery Counties as well as parts of Otsego and Schoharie Counties — 2 per day.

European Hare

December 15 - February 28 — in Albany, Columbia, Delaware, Dutchess, Greene, Montgomery, Orange, Otsego, Putnam, Rensselaer, Rockland, Schoenectady, Schoharie, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester Counties, as well as Southern Zone parts of Fulton, Herkimer, Saratoga and Washington Counties — 1 per day.

Wild Turkey

October 28 - November 16 — in Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung, Delaware, Schuyler, Steuben, Tioga and Tompkins Counties, as well as parts of Cortland and Onondaga Counties (See Guide) — 1 in fall.

May 5 - 18 — bearded turkeys only, in Allegany, Broome, Cattaraugus, Delaware, Sullivan, Tioga and Wyoming Counties, as well as parts of Albany, Chautauqua, Chemung, Chenango, Cortland, Erie, Genesee, Greene, Livingston, Madison, Onondaga, Orange, Otsego, Schoharie, Schuyler, Seneca, Steuben, Tompkins, and Ulster Counties (map to be furnished with spring permit) — 1 in spring

Raccoon

October 1 - March 16 — upstate — no limit. (No closed season in Orange County.)

Woodcock

September 2 - November 23 — in Northern Zone — 5 per day — 10 in possession.

October 1 - November 23 — in Southern Zone — 5 per day — 10 in possession.

Common Crow

September 1 - November 15, and February 12 - March 31 — No limit.

LONG ISLAND

Squirrel

November 1 - January 31 — 5 per day

Ruffed Grouse (Partridge)

November 1 - December 31 — 1 per day.

Pheasants *

November 1 - December 31 — (Sundays included) — 4 per day — 30 per season.

November 1 - December 31 — 6 per day — 40 per season

Cottontail Rabbit

November 1 - February 15 — 6 per day.

September 1 - November 15 and February 12 - March 31 — No Limit.

Notice of Proposed Change in Telephone Rate Schedules

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that on June 28, 1974, Iroquois Telephone Corporation filed with the Public Service Commission rate changes to become effective on July 29, 1974. The proposed rates are included in Tariff Schedule P. S. C. — N. Y. — No. 5 — Telephone which contains rates, regulations, and explanation of terms applicable to general and local exchange service and will supersede presently filed tariff schedule P. S. C. — N. Y. — No. 2 — Telephone.

The proposed new schedule will increase revenues by approximately \$726,132 or 33.0 percent above the level generated by Schedule No. 2 during the 12 months ended December 31, 1973. However, the proposed schedule will affect individual service and charges by different percentages.
