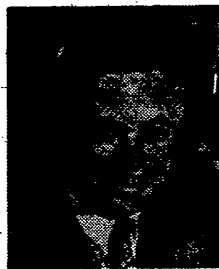
Considerable work is being done on the Andover Water System, located on the Dean Farm on South Hill. J. L. Williams is doing the cement work.

Do you think that President Nixon's recent tour of the Middle East accomplished anything of substance?

A. B.—Bronxville

It will be difficult to fully assess the trip until all of the detailed agreements have been made public. However, there have been two intangible, yet significant consequences. Among the watchful diplomatic community the President's trip has signalled America's firm commitment to work for a peaceful settlement of Mideast tensions. Moreover his trip has demonstrated to the Arab countries that the United States is willing to pursue an even-handed policy in the Middle East.

As one who has been active in the consumer movement for the past several years, I would like to know your opinion of the proposed Consumer Protection Agency.

B. G.—Rome

I believe that to a substantial extent this bill constitutes a fraud on the consumer. Instead of addressing themselves to the alleged deficiencies of existing consumer protection legislation, the authors propose to create still another entity, the Consumer Protection Agency, whose administrator would be endowed with powers that are dazzling in their scope. It is the administrator and the administrator alone who will determine what is in the interest of consumers, and his determination is not reviewable by any court of law. He can intervene in any proceeding before any federal agency, can go to court to reopen proceedings and decisions hitherto considered final. He may go as far as to disclose trade secrets and other private information which he deems are "necessary to protect the health or safety of the public." If the administrator has been proven to be imprudent in his determination, he is instructed to issue an apology. One can only conclude that this administrator, whoever he or she may be, has unprecedented authority unchecked by any reasonable safeguards. In the long run, I believe this bill will simply create one more costly agency and hamstringing other agencies that are designed to protect specific consumer interests. Moreover, by contributing to bureaucratic delay, the bill will add to the costs of doing business—costs which, no doubt, will be passed on to the consumer.
