Twenty-six Greenwood Central School District voters came out Thursday and approved two financial resolutions concerning surplus funds. The vote on each resolution was 24 yes and 2 no. The first resolution authorizes the Board to set aside \$10,000 in the general fund for the 1974-75 school year to reduce taxes and \$28,000 in the building reserve fund for repairs and remodeling to the school.

The second resolution authorizes the Board to set aside \$2,000 in a reserve fund for installation of a grease rack in the school bus garage and replacement of the garage roof.

The well is drilled by Fairman Brothers of DuBois, Pa., for Anderson Oil Co., of Denver, Colo. It has an estimated capacity of 20 million cu. ft. of gas in a 24-hour period. The well is 3000 feet east of a dry well drilled two weeks ago on the Gerald Cornell property. It is in the Wyckoff gas field explored several years ago. Several producing wells were produced at that time by the Wyckoff Development Corp., of State College, Pa. The drillers reached 60 feet into the reef. It came at a higher depth than expected, preparations for capping the well were not ready and the gas was permitted to escape.
