Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at the Village Office August 19, 1974 at 7:30. Those present: James Bliss, Mayor — Avery Mead, Robert Baker and Paul Hyland, Trustees and Dr. Roger Blaisdell, Health Officer.

Minutes of the Meeting held July 8th and special meeting held July 30, were read and approved on a motion made by Robert Baker seconded by Avery Mead. Carried.

Moved by Paul Hyland and seconded by Robert Baker for the Electric Department to purchase 2 of the Electric Boxes used by the Sesqui-Centennial Committee for future use. Carried.

Dr. Blaisdell, Health Officer, was present for a lengthy discussion of drainage problems on Water St. There will be a Special Board Meeting, Monday, August 26th to see what solution can be reached.

It was noted that there will be a meeting of the Youth Committee and a representative of the State Youth Commission on September 4th for the evaluation of the Summer Playground.

Moved by Robert Baker and seconded by Avery Mead to issue Wesley Grossman a building permit for an addition of a shed to his garage. Carried.

Moved by Robert Baker and seconded by Paul Hyland, the following resolution:

Whereas: The State of New York committee on Public Access to records, has drafted a Freedom of Information Act as of September 1, 1974;

NOW THEREFORE: the law requires every agency to make the following kinds of records available to the public:

Final opinions made in the adjudication of cases;

Statements of policy and interpretation adopted by an agency including any documents, memoranda, data or other material constituting statistical or factual tabulations which led to the formulation thereof.

Minutes of meetings and public hearings.

Internal and external audits and statistical or factual tabulations.

Administrative staff manuals and instructions to staff that affect members of the public.

Police blotters and booking records.

The name, address, title salary of every agency employees of law enforcement agencies. The list will be limited to titles and salaries only. These lists are available only to the news media.

Final determinations and dissenting opinions of members of the governing body. Any other files, records, papers or documents required by any other provision of law to be made available for public inspection and copying.

These records are available at the Village Office, 4 Main St., Andover, N. Y., and are open for inspection during business hours Monday thru Friday, and will be copied for .25 cents per page by the Clerk.

A full copy of the freedom of information act is attached to the minutes of his meeting.
