Greenwood Central Board met Monday night and made four faculty appointments. Roy Yarnell was named high school Science teacher to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Robert Shreiner, who has accepted a position at Niagara Falls. Mr. Yarnell has taught at Woods Hole and Falmouth Schools in Mass., and California State College and Boston University. He has his Bachelor and Master's Degrees from California State College.

The Board accepted the resignation of Miss Nancy Wright, Secondary English teacher, who has accepted a position at Baldwinville and named Steven Kickbush for the position. He is a graduate of State University College at Fredonia and taught at Little Valley Central School. He has just completed four years service with the Navy.

Jane Anderson has been named to teach Elementary Reading and English. She is from Wellsville and is a June graduate from Lycoming College at Williamsport, Pa.

Cherry Smith, a June graduate of Mansfield State College, Mansfield, Pa., has been named to teach Secondary Spanish and part time English. She has 21 credits from Indiana University, Pa., obtained in Valladolid Spain. The Board accepted the resignation of Jeanne Fisher as Library Aide and Judy York from the Library Staff. Miss York has accepted a position at the Rochester School for the Deaf.

There was a discussion on girls' Athletic Activities. The 67 girls in Grades 7 - 12 have been sent a notice of a new policy and asked to indicate which sport they would be interested in, such sports participation would mean physical requirements and attendance at practice sections. Seventeen girls had replied. The Board wants more response and will make plans and what sport will be offered next year, name a coach and decide on the type of program.

The Board approved an increase in school lunch prices. Prices for students K-3 increased from 30c to 35c; students 4-12 increased from 40c to 45c; adult lunches increased from 80c - 85c. The price for milk will be 10 cents a half pint until amount of aid for school milk program is determined. Bids were opened for milk and ice cream. The contract for milk was given to Dairylea which bid 9.4 for white milk and 10.4 for chocolate milk. Guilford Dairies submitted 10.3 and 11.3. Perry Ice Cream was the only bid for ice cream at \$1.05 a dozen dixie cups and was given the bid.

Engineer Robert Hunt of Addison informed the Board that the sewer project is on schedule and plans will be submitted by September 1 to the State Department of Environmental Conservation and the State Department.

Principal Gary Moore reported on the summer recreation program which ends this week and the nursery school program. Both were successful. The nursery program was not school sponsored but used the Kindergarten Room. Thursday A. M. as authorized by the Board.

The Board will approve the tax roll at the August 26 meeting. It will meet with an architect from Fudge and Underhill of Elmira, to discuss the first steps on school repair and remodeling program.

District voters at a special meeting August 8, authorized the Board to take \$28,000 from the surplus funds and put it in building reserve fund for school repair and remodeling.

Saturday, August 10, five Webelo Scouts and their families of Pack 13, Greenwood, attended the annual Steuben Area Council Pack Day at Boy Scout Camp Gorton on Waneta Lake.

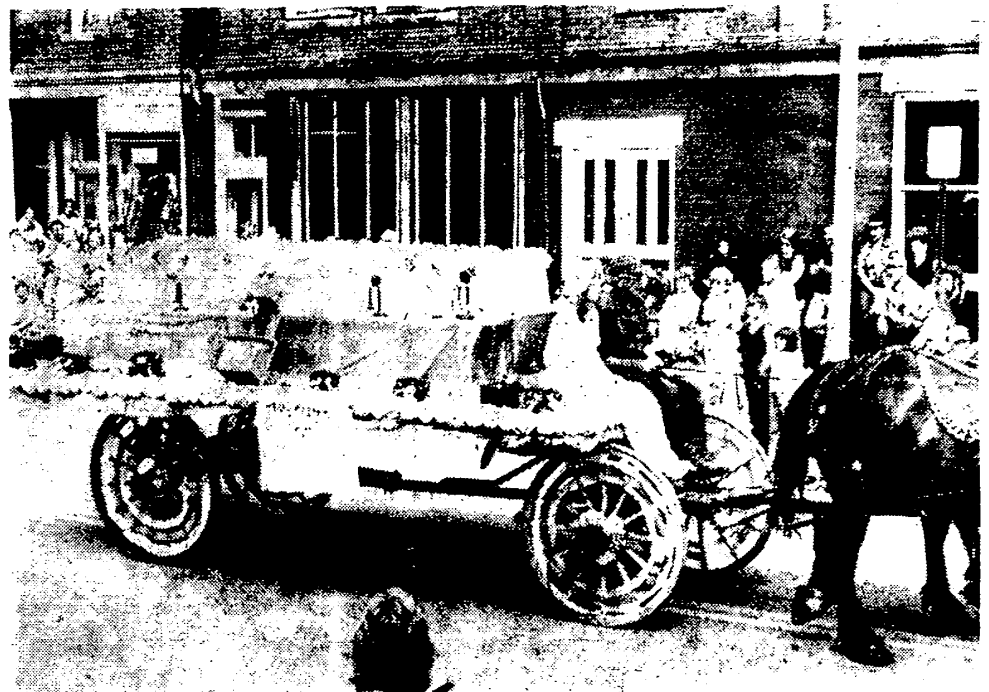

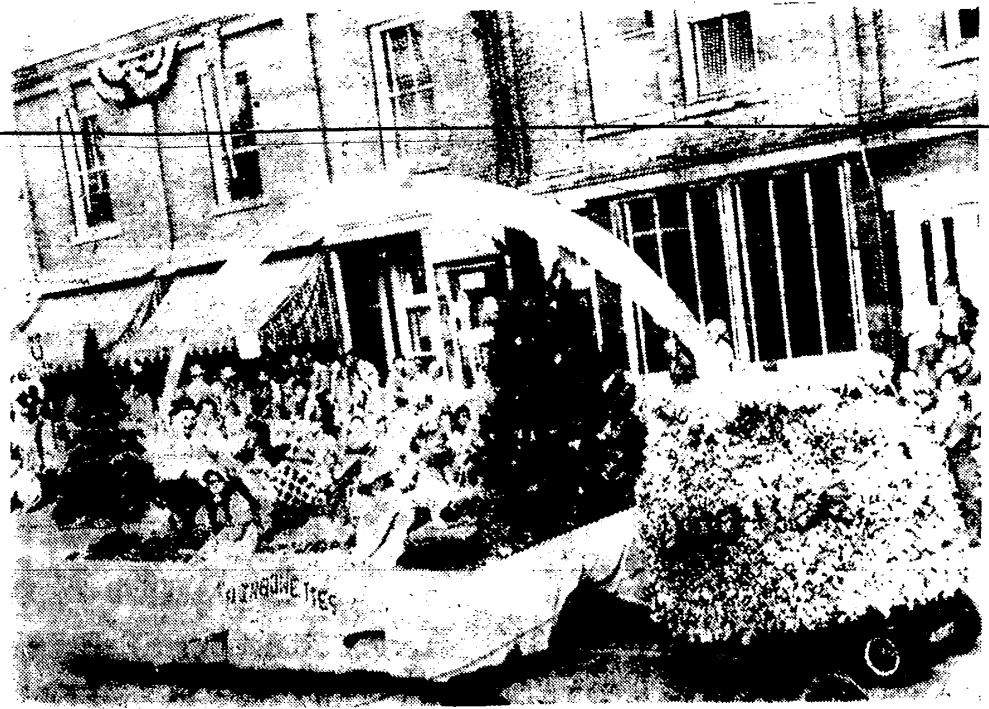
The Mixed Nuts Float that won the 3rd Place Trophy in the Class for Originality.
