HOLLAND SCHEDULES BIGGEST RACE DAY

This Saturday, August 31, Holland Speedway will present its most ambitious race program in its 15 year history. A day long schedule of festivities, commencing at 12:00 noon will lead to the big Genesee National (150) lap open invitational race for Late Model Sportsman. The big event carries a \$10,000 purse with a possible \$2,000 to the winner. Back to defend his 1973 victory will be Michigan's finest Late Model Sportsman Driver, Bob Sennecker of Dorr, Michigan. In the 1973 event, Sennecker appeared out of the running when his engine blew during practice. But within an hour, Sennecker had completely changed the engine in time to qualify and go on to win the big event. Cayuga Champion, Jerry McKara, who holds the record for the fastest one lap time at the Speedway, will provide the chief competition along with Holland hopefuls Art Clark of West

Seneca and Richie Wrobel of Elma.

The afternoon's session will see practice starting at 12:00 Noon — followed by time trials and qualifying heats for Late Model Sportsman, Chargers and TQ Mid-gets. Following a chicken barbecue, the fans will be entertained by Marching Bands and the Shriner Motorcycle Precision Team. The feature events will get underway at 7:00 p. m. for the four divisions including the TQ Mid-gets. At 8:30 the big Genesee National (150) will get the green flag for the fastest of 30 qualifiers.

As an added attraction, Dick Hammond of Heussler Helicopter Service will donate free rides to lucky spectators in order to view all the activity from the air.

A limited number of reserve seats are available for the day long event. General Admission tickets go on sale at 11:30 a. m.

The following Saturday, September 7, Westcraft Industries will sponsor the Championship races for all four popular divisions.

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
