Mrs. Shirley Cook was appointed Elementary Coordinator by the Greenwood Central School Board at the Monday night meeting. She replaces Virginia York, who is now the school's Media Center Coordinator. Student population at Greenwood Central School has dropped by 10 between the first day of 1973-74 and the first day of the current term. Supervising Principal Gary Moore, told the Board the total is 331 and of that there are 177 boys and 154 girls now attending school.

Mr. Moore also told the Board that the school is awaiting approval from the State Conservation Department in Avon before it starts its sewer renovation project, designed to correct the problem of raw sewage being discharged into a nearby stream. He is not sure when the project can start.

The Board authorized Mr. Moore to formulate a statement on Senior privileges. In previous years the Board detailed such statements. He has started working on it and said it mostly pertains to off campus privileges. The Board approved an audit by Edward Yazak of Wellsville for the 1973-74 school year. A petty cash fund of \$7 was set up for the Cafeteria. The formula for the expenditure of State Aid for the school's special needs program, was okayed. The Board agreed on a new form for the use of the school building by non-school groups. It authorized cooperation with the new State Freedom of Information Law and appointed Mr. Moore as fiscal officer and records officer to meet the requirements of that law.

Approval was given to spend Reading Teacher Jane Anderson on a Corrective Reading Workshop in Rochester September 23 and 24 and also the paying of her expenses.

Greenwood officially became the 12th member of the Steuben County Girls Soccer League Monday night when the school's Board of Education went on record as going full force into girls athletics. The school is starting off this Fall with soccer and will be adding track, volleyball, basketball and softball later. Four schools joined the league this season, Greenwood, Canaseraga, Jasper and Troupsburg. Jeanne Hollenbeck has been named Greenwood's first Interscholastic Girls Varsity Soccer Coach. Athletic Director, Thomas Kumar, announced an 11 game schedule for the girls in the Steuben County League this season, beginning with the opening September 23 at home against Prattsburg. Kumar said 19 girls signed up but is now 12 or 13 players. He said there is interest and he thinks more will come.

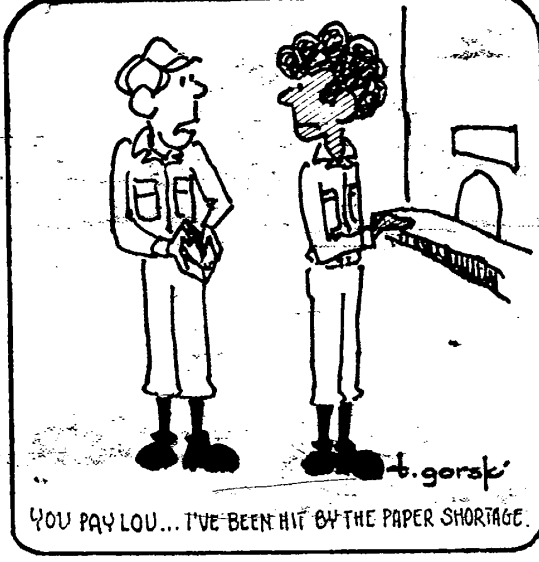
Bible Baptist Church Reports Good Attendance

May we of Andover put Christ in the center of our community and God will put us in the center of his blessings.

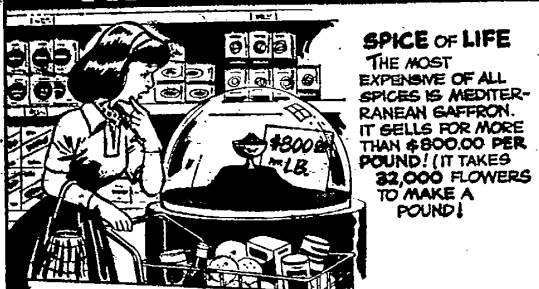

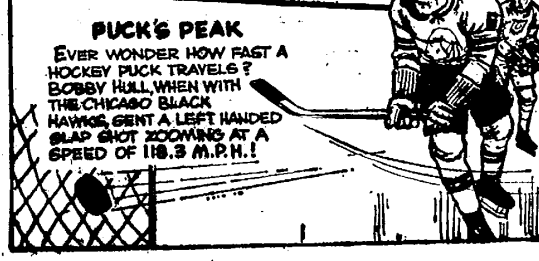
