



slept in shepherd's huts or caves, in order to carry the Christian gospel to the Quechua-speaking Indians.

They report that automobile roads have not penetrated many areas of Peru, but the terrain makes it necessary for missionaries in remote areas to use the mule, dugout canoe, motor launch or raft.

"Prejudice against the Protestant missionary which was once so prevalent and intense has been giving way to a real hunger on the part of the people to know Jesus Christ for themselves," the Sluyters point out.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Sluyter have taught and aided in the direction of the Alliance Theological Institute at Huanuco, in Evangelism-in-Depth projects and the planting of new churches in Trujillo, Laredo and Chambote.

They also spent many months in aiding the people who suffered so greatly in the destructive earthquake of 1970.

An American missionary engaged in educational projects in the city of Zamboanga will report on the progress of Protestant

He is the Rev. Gordon L. Strong of Appleton, N. Y., home on a year's furlough from his overseas assignment with The Christian and Missionary Alliance. He will be among the guest speakers during the annual missionary convention in the C & A M Church, located on Rochambeau Avenue. Dates of the special emphasis on missions are October 3-6. The public is invited to all sessions beginning at 7:30 p. m. daily and 11:00 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. on Sunday.

During the past four years, Mr. and Mrs. Strong have been responsible for the administration and teaching in the Alliance hostel for missionaries' children and in the American school for these children, both in Zamboanga.

Mr. Strong has also served as a teacher in Ebenezer Bible College where young men and women pre-

pare for the ministry in The Christian and Missionary Alliance Churches of the Philippines. Almost 500 organized and unorganized congregations and groups comprise the national church with 516 national workers.

As a missionary on the field, Mr. Strong also has many opportunities to travel within the interior of the Philippines to preach and counsel in pastors' conferences, missionary conventions and youth rallies.

A veteran woman missionary who since going to Peru with her husband in 1939 has lived and worked and ministered in the mountains, in the jungle, and on the seacoast, will come to Andover to take part in a church missionary conference.

She is Mrs. A. Merle Sluyter, who has the distinction of being the first lady missionary to enter two of Peru's interior provincial capitals and who knows what it is like to be surrounded by a hostile group of fanatical Indians. She will be among the guest speakers during the annual missionary convention in the Christian & Missionary Alliance Church, located on Rochambeau Avenue.
