In plain words — grow up; quit being a crybaby. Get out of your dream world and develop a backbone, not a wishbone, and start acting like a man or a woman.

You're supposed to be mature enough to accept some of the responsibilities your parents have carried for years. They have nursed, protected, helped, appealed, begged, excused, tolerated and denied themselves so that you could have every benefit. You have no right to expect them to bow to every whim and fancy just because your selfish ego. — Instead of common sense, dominates your life, personality, thinking, requests, demands.

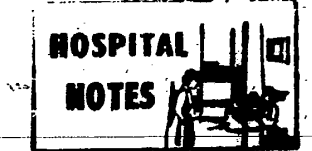

PARENTS — DO YOU KNOW WHERE

YOUR CHILDREN ARE NIGHTS? An Editorial

We feel reasonably sure that if we asked this question of parents: "do you know where your children are nights"? That 90 to 95% would answer indignantly: "of course we do"!

And, since this is a very general question, if you answered: "downtown with the gang" you would be right — at least part of the time.

Thus, let's change the question to: "Parents, do you know what your children are doing nights"? And, if you answer positively to this question, your children would have to be at home — in your sight — in order for you to be 100% correct! That is, of course, unless you know that they are out "raising hell" — and you are giving "tacit approval" — or else just don't "give a damn"!

For all the parents that have the attitude: "our children can do no wrong" — we actually feel sorry for your children, as you are doing them much more harm than as if you were giving them the proper parental guidance and discipline that they actually need, and sometimes crave. In the past, we have tried to warn parents about things that we observed or heard about as far as their children were concerned and ended up being "the bad guy" so, we learned the hard way — to keep things to ourselves.

However, whenever any young people have come to us with a problem, or even adults as far as that is concerned, we have tried to give them the benefit of our experience in the form of advice that we believe in as well as help them in any way that we could. We haven't forgotten that we were young once, and if we hadn't had someone that we could turn to, we could have had more serious problems than we ended up with.

How many of you parents would consider that it was your 12 year old son that was up in the "Grove" drinking beer with the other boys? Or, that your 15 year old son would get into the "beer and booze" with the other boys to prove that he was a "regular feller"? Or that your 17-year old son was being served booze regularly in an area "gin mill" and that during one of these sessions got "bombed" and went out to see how fast his car would go in reverse — and then drop it in Drive — and drop the rear-end out of it? Or, that your son would take his car out in the country and play "chicken" with other drivers — just to see them head for the ditch? Or would "blast" people out of bed at 2 or 3 a. m., with a "roaring engine" and "squealing tires"?

What is YOUR Son doing nights when he is "down-town" with the "boys"? Is he one of the "gang" that thinks it is great sport to go up and down the Streets knocking on doors and windows of elderly, retired ladies that live alone to see how much they can scare them? Is it your son that even comes up with an idea like this and suggests it to the "gang" he is with so that it ends up with a broken window — that one of the members has to pay the penalty and punishment for? As far as we are concerned, the lad that makes a suggestion to his "gang" is just as much to blame, if not more-so, than any other member that is in on the deal!

We know who some of these young people are as well as Law Officers and other residents. And, unless this nonsense is stopped immediately — perhaps it could be YOUR son that is Hauled in to either "Family Court" or "Justice Court" — depending on his age and/or, Police Record.

We do not believe in making idle threats — this is merely a PROMISE! If warrants need to be served, pictures need to be taken — whatever!

Won't you help to make our Community a safe and decent place for everyone to live in and enjoy all of their Freedoms by seeing that your children obey the law and the evening Curfew?
