



Wm. J. Farrell and Jo Ann Clark Exchange Wedding Vows

Farrell of 4608 Limeledge Road, Marcellus, N. Y., on Saturday, August 24, 1974. The 1:00 P. M. double-ring nuptial Mass was celebrated by the Rev. James A. Grimmer at the Immaculate Conception Church in Wellsville.

Providing the background music was Greg Shelley of Belmont, organist and Mrs. James Perkins of Batavia, cousin of the bride, who sang "We've Only Just Begun" and "There Is Love".

Escorted to the altar by her father, the bride wore a high-waisted gown of peau de sole which was fashioned by her mother. It featured bishop sleeves with wide lace, buttoned cuffs and a lace-edged detachable train. The neckband and inset of Venetian lace was edged with narrow crocheted type lace and Aurora sequined braid trim.
