St. Mary's Church in Rexville celebrated Sunday, October 6th during special ceremonies observing the rededication of the church. The Most Rev. Joseph L. Hogan, Bishop of the Rochester Diocese, was the celebrant of a Mass of Thanksgiving and Blessing at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Otto J. Vogt, Pastor and the Rev. William J. Cosgrove, Chaplain of St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, assisted the Bishop. Priests from Auburn, Corning, Hornell, Addison, Caledonia, Naples, Henrietta, Rochester, Fairport, Elmira, Aurora, Montezuma and Seneca Falls were in attendance for the Liturgy of the High Mass.

Interior painting began in March 1973. Carpeting painting and varnishing continued through 1973 and into 1974. Many memorial gifts have been given. The first church in Rexville was built in 1875. It burned in February 1877. Seven months after the fire the present church was built and dedicated September 14, 1877. At that time there were 75 parishioners.

J. Richard Roenigk Completes Training Program

Graduation exercises Friday evening, Sept. 13, 1974, in St. Louis, Mo., climaxed a week of intensive training for J. Richard Roenigk of Canisteo, N. Y. He and 42 other Sales Trainees of the Ralston Purina Company took part in a headquarters school designed to update the sales force in the Chow Division.

Held at the Learning Center of the Purina Agri-Business Institute in Downtown, St. Louis, the Basic Sales School combined information gathered from both research and marketing segments of Ralston Purina. Two and a half days were spent early in the week touring the sprawling Gray Summit Research Farm operated by the livestock feed manufacturing company. At the farm, Richard and the other "students" saw tests being conducted with experimental feeds and ultra-modern equipment.

"I've come home convinced that when any new techniques are developed to help the American farmer produce more food at a faster, more economical rate, it will very likely come from research work being conducted at the Gray Summit Research unit,"

Richard says. Richard is a team member of the largest feed manufacturing company in the world, Ralston Purina Company, which was founded in 1894, produces more feed for U. S. livestock than the next four largest feed companies combined. Richard has been with the Chow Division of Ralston Purina since April 1, 1974.

Ag-Tech Visited 60 Years Later

A man who may be the oldest retired college president in the nation returned to Alfred recently for a look at the school he headed some 60 years ago.

William J. Wright, 93, is the visitor who came back to see the modern campus of the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred.

The two-year college was established in 1909 and Mr. Wright was the second president of the school which was then known as the New York State School of Agriculture at Alfred University. He headed the college from 1912 to 1918 when he left to accept a post at Cornell University.

Now a resident of Northampton, Mass., Mr. Wright came to Alfred by car with his grand son Chandler Wright. They had a dual purpose in their local visit: Mr. Wright was anxious to see the new campus of Alfred State College, while his grandson is considering attending neighboring Alfred

University

Mr. Wright spent considerable times with Alfred State College's current president, Dr. David H. Huntington. The two toured the hillside campus by car since Mr. Wright has difficulty walking.

Dr. Huntington pointed out many of the modern structures which have been built on what was farm land at the time Mr. Wright was president and noted that most of the new structures have been completed in the last ten years.

When told Alfred's student population has passed 4,000, Mr. Wright recalled that there were 140 when he left in 1918.

Dr. Huntington, referring to a recently published book on the first 60 years of Alfred State College history, reminded his colleague that it was Mr. Wright who first noted in his annual report: "We need more space."

Said Dr. Huntington, "As you can see, we got it."

Mr. Wright's last visit to Alfred was some 15 years ago and he observed that the changes in just that short span "are unbelievable."
