Veterans News

FREE HUNTING & BIG GAME LICENSES can be picked up by area veterans - if they have a 40% or more disability incurred in service. They must, of course, have been residents of New York State for three months immediately prior to the date of application, and must produce a statement from the VA certifying to their disability. Servicemen, too, can get in on the free hunting this fall if they are residents of the State but are stationed elsewhere, and not be on leave for more than 30 days. A copy of their leave or furlough papers must be carried with them. If big game hunting is intended, then the serviceman has to purchase a big game license. Veterans and servicemen are cautioned however, that with license goes responsibility. The mere fact that a free license is issued does not exempt them from the State Department of Environmental Conservation's regulations concerning safety instruction for new hunters, possession and transportation of game, hunting on private lands, dates of open season, of other such regulations. Contact the counseling center of the New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs for more information on free hunting licenses. The local center is located at the Municipal Bldg., Wellsville, N. Y., on Tuesdays and at the City Building 108 Broadway, Hornell, N. Y., on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

WANT YOUR OWN HOME BUT CAN'T AFFORD ONE? Look into the possibility of purchasing a mobile home under the GI Bill's home loan program. Many young couples use them for their first home since they are financially able to afford a conventionally built one. Once the mobile home is paid for, entitlement to a GI home loan is reinstated. Contact your State Veteran Counselor for details.
