

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Andover Central School Board of Education was called to order by the President, Francis Horan on Tuesday, October 15, 1974. Mr. Jordan and the following Board members were present: Carl Atwell and William Walker. Dr. Hollowach, District Superintendent was also in attendance.

Dr. Hollowach presented an informative talk on the area schools and B.O.C.E.S.

The minutes of the September regular meeting were read for approval. Dr. Walker made the motion to accept these as read — Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and District Treasurer's reports were read for comparison and approval. These reports were moved for approval by William Walker and seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Board approved the investing of Tax Funds in Certificates of Deposit for 60 days. Carl Atwell made the motion and Dr. Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The General Fund Warrant was presented for approval. Amount — \$24,811.93. Francis Horan made the motion and it was seconded by William Walker. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria Warrant was for \$2,529.58. Carl Atwell made the motion that this be accepted and William Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Board approved the payments of four items that were not listed on the warrant. These items — invoice copies are to be made a part of these minutes. William Walker made the motion and Francis Horan seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes. The amount of these items totaled \$265.00.

The Board approved the interest on Certificate of Deposit No. 21386 being invested in another C. D. — Amount \$348.53. Motion made by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Board approved the adding of the interest earned on C. D. No. 18487 to our Savings Account. Amount — \$37.28. William Walker made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

A motion to approve the attached "Freedom of Information" policy was made by William Walker and seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

A motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker to file the Cafeteria report with the minutes. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Board of Education approved the payment of Principal and Interest due on Bus No. 27. Principal of \$2,100.00 and Interest of \$51.52. Francis Horan made the motion and William Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Board of Education voted to accept the B.O.C.E.S. Services contract for the 1974-75 school year. Carl Atwell made the motion and Francis Horan seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

A motion was made by William Walker to approve the payroll of \$44,530.59. Carl Atwell seconded. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Correspondence was read from Daniel Knapik and Bolton Central School Board.

A motion to adopt special milk provisions amendment was made by Francis Horan and seconded by Carl Atwell. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Motion by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker to approve the enclosed regular bid of L. C. Bradford. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

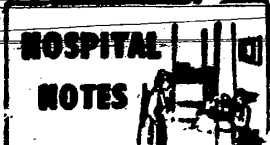
Motion by Carl Atwell and seconded by Francis Horan to change the amount allowed per mile from 10c to 15c per mile. Carried by 3
