Ask Senator

I have read several editorials recently which say that the recent Supreme Court decision that prohibits forced busing across county lines will set back the cause of civil rights. Do you agree?

A. R.—Brooklyn

Absolutely not. The Supreme Court took a rational, commonsense approach to the problem of education. It is one thing to prevent a child from going to a school because of the color of his skin. In 1954 the Supreme Court rightly prohibited such discrimination. However, it is something else to force a child to go to a certain school because of the color of his skin. This form of racial engineering is opposed by a great majority of parents, both black and white. Hopefully, the Court's recent decision will signal a return to common sense as we work to assure each American quality education.

How will the troubles in Cyprus between our two NATO allies — Greece and Turkey, affect America's security interests?

G. J.—Syracuse

Over the past several years the Soviets have expanded their naval forces in the Mediterranean. This presents America with two challenges. First, we must maintain the integrity of the NATO alliance. Second, we must maintain our structure of naval bases in the eastern Mediterranean. These bases are placed in the area of the world which is most likely to explode. The Middle East. America must make every effort to prevent the current troubles on Cyprus from escalating into a full scale war between Greece and Turkey, both of whom are bulwarks against Soviet expansion.

In past years Congress has routinely approved all bills which appropriate funds for federal agencies. But this year many of these bills are running into strong opposition. Why the sudden change?

Now that inflation is the number one political issue some legislators are beginning to scrutinize appropriations bills with an eye to reducing excessive expenditures. Hopefully, this trend will continue until the converts to fiscal conservatism represents a majority in Congress.
