

## GET OUT AND VOTE!!!

### An Editorial

Next Tuesday is ELECTION DAY! True, it is a "so-called" OFF Year — with no Presidential Race at stake. But, it is just as important — or more so since the future of New York State, at least in our own "Up-State" area, is at stake with a selection to be made for Governor and Congressmen. And, YOU — THE VOTERS and TAXPAYERS are the only ones that can do anything about it!

With Watergate and its after-math still fresh in our minds it can be readily understood that many voters are disgusted, fed up with lies, and thoroughly disenchanted with all politicians. However, to use this for an excuse for not voting is unthinkable! What we need desperately this year — and from now on — is HONESTY! Honesty on both the side of the Voter and the Politician — for without this important virtue — our Great Democracy is doomed!

In our American process of Democracy, when we are not satisfied with the way things are being run, we, the Voters, are charged with the responsibility of making a change in an orderly and legal manner by using our constitutionally based privilege of VOTING at Public Elections! And, in order to vote wisely, we must be intelligently informed about each candidate — not by flowery oratory, false charges, mis-leading statements or promises of "pie-in-the sky" nature — but by cold hard facts, voting records, and fiscal responsibility!

With this criteria in mind we unreservedly endorse Malcolm Wilson for Governor and James "Jim" Emery for Assemblyman from our District. They have done more to see that we in the rural "Up-State" Area received a "fair shake" in our needs for "Aid for Education", "Highway Needs", "Assistance for Senior Citizens" etc., than any other politicians. (The completion of manholes of the 4-lane Route 17 in our area; the assistance after Agnes and the flood of '72; the passing of new laws for stricter law enforcement; assistance programs for Education, and Senior Citizens; as well as local Revenue Sharing Programs — these are all a matter of public record!)

Compare this with what we feel is the financial irresponsibility shown by Candidate Carey in his contest for selection as Democratic candidate for Governor in the Primaries when both he and Howard Samuels reportedly spent hundreds of thousands of dollars over the campaign limits set by the New York State Legislature this year! Then too, Candidate Carey is from New York City so do you think for one minute that he knows — or even cares whether we even exist? Isn't it more than likely that if he is elected, New York City will get all the "cake and bread" while we will have to furnish the dough — and be lucky if we even end up with "the crumbs"?

As far as the other candidates on the ballot are concerned, we leave it up to you Voters to study their records, weigh their promises and ability as well as the possibility and feasibility of carrying them out. Make up your mind — and then GET OUT, AND VOTE!!!

In addition to the candidates on the ballot this year, there is one Proposition and there are sixteen Proposed Amendments to be voted on.

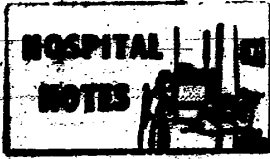
Proposition Number One is the "Rail Preservation Bond Issue" and after a great deal of study and professional advice we have concluded that this service is necessary for rural areas and would be absolutely essential in case of a fuel shortage or other emergency. Thus we recommend a YES Vote on the Proposition. However, as far as the Proposed Amendments are concerned, they are so lengthy and of such a highly legal nature that we do not feel qualified to recommend a Yes or No vote on them. Last week we were informed that our crossing guard Mrs. Gaus would no longer be able to work under the federal manpower programs. I'd like to ask everyone who expects the Village Crew to pick-up leaves at the curb to have them out this week-end. Monday will probably be the last day the crew will pick-up. The dump truck will have a new sander on it next week and will not be available for hauling.

Thursday night, October 24, I attended a Civil Defense meeting in Belmont. The meeting was devoted primarily to explaining the procedures to follow in event of disaster. The procedures related mainly to financial concerns. The new law is going to require much more detailed information as to damage and need of the Village than previously. On the individual level it is my understanding that there will be no disaster relief for those who had a previous disaster and then did not take out adequate insurance, flood or otherwise. The forgiveness aspect of future aid may not be available.
