The Byron Dibble home on the High-Up Road four miles east of Greenwood, was completely destroyed by fire early Wednesday. The alarm was turned in by State Police who were stopped below Woodhull, by a trucker who reported seeing a glow in the sky. Thirty Greenwood Firemen responded to the alarm and found the home of Dibble, who is 80, completely engulfed and nearly consumed by flames.

Mr. Dibble lived alone and had no phone. He started to a neighbor's to seek help when the fire started. He is staying with his son, Merle Dibble of Andover. The fire is believed to have started in the electrical system of the small house. The Firemen also had the Town Truck with 3000 gallons of water and an ambulance to the fire. A second alarm was sounded about 5:30 A. M., when a grass fire started on the farm.

Clair J. Updyke, 82, died at his home in Hornell, Thursday, October 25, 1974. He was a native of Greenwood, where he was a farmer for many years. He was also a proprietor of restaurants in Woodhull and Andover, and had lived in Hornell for 23 years. He was a booster member of the Canisteo American Legion Post.

He is survived by two sons, Robert of R.D. Willseyville and Owen of Kenosha, Wis.; two daughters, Mrs. Francis Long of R.D. 2 Addison and Mrs. Arthur Kincaid of Homer; a step-daughter, Mrs. Albert Warner of Arkport; a step-son, Roger Whitmore of Watertown; a sister, Mrs. James Hockman of Pompano Beach, Florida; 21 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren.
