

GOP Loses Control Of N. Y. State

Democrats seized control of New York State for the first time in 16 years with Carey winning a crushing victory over Governor Wilson and ended up with a huge majority in the State Assembly for only the third time in 40 years. Republicans retained control of the State Senate although by a narrowed margin than before.

Here in Andover and Allegany County Republicans followed the standard "rock-ribbed" Republican precedent that has been in effect for many years — but less decisively than in past years.

Veterans Day Observance Announced

Although the date of the holiday will be different this year, the original meaning of the holiday will take on even greater emphasis. Commander Yorton of Lynch-Burgett Post No. 397, The American Legion stated in announcing plans for Andover's observance of Veterans Day.

This year the observance has been changed back to Monday, November 11th, and justly so since this marks the first time in many years that our American Troops have not been embroiled in Armed Warfare on some foreign soil in an effort to combat the spread of Communism.

Veterans Day was designated as a holiday in 1954 as a holiday in honor of the men and women who had served in the uniform of the United States and dedicated to the attainment of an honorable world peace. Then in 1968 Veterans Day was one of the four holidays changed to a specific Monday under the provisions of Public Law No. 0-363 passed by the Congress. Now it has made the "grand circuit" and is back to its original date — and hopefully, will be left alone in the future.

All Citizens of Andover are invited to take part in the community-wide observance of Veterans Day on November 11th which will assemble in front of the Legion Home on Center Street at 10:30 a. m., sharp. The Andover Central School Band will then lead the parade to the American Legion Park on West Greenwood Street and form into ranks for the observance. American Legion Chaplain Walter Gath will offer a prayer, followed by music rendered by the ACS Band with Post Commander Clyde Yorton then greeting the assembly and introducing guest speaker Sgt. Fred Howe Army Recruiter from Wells-ville. The program will be concluded with Commander Yorton delivering a short message and the ACS Band playing the "Star Spangled Banner" during the raising of the "Colors".

All households and business places are urged to display the American Flag to mark the occasion.

VETERANS DAY

An Editorial

Veterans Day, 1974 is an occasion to salute all the men and women, from 1775 to the present, whose services in uniform have been vital to our country's growth, and more than once to its very survival.

The dedication of this day to all veterans properly focuses the Nation's attention. The truth is that, in the final analysis, it is not solely massive armies, navies, and air forces or industrial might that wins wars. Rather, victories are won by men — lonely individuals whose skills, courage, determination, and sacrifices, establish the measure of our Nation's strength.

While we can't recall it, there probably wasn't a moment of national relief and jubilation like that experienced by America on the eleventh hour of the eleventh month in 1918 — the World War I Armistice Day which since World War II has been changed to Veterans Day and is observed as a National Holiday.

After World War I, this sacred moment was observed throughout our schools, public offices and across our nation by moments of silence.

It had been the "war to end all wars" — at least to Veterans and Americans. Great sacrifices had been made — but perpetual peace had been at last achieved! Yet this lasted just a little over 20 years.

This coming Monday, November 11th, we honor the men who also died in another great World Conflict, World War II, in addition to those who have paid the supreme sacrifice in Korea, Vietnam and other so-called Police Actions along the Communist Frontiers.

The presence of our American Soldiers at these jumping off places of Civilization are a living reminder that despite all the talk of peace — a strong American force is an absolute necessity to preserve our American Ideals and Ways of Life and Liberty.

This Veterans Day should remind us as a nation that we have been subjected to periods of trial, peril and despair — and we have endured. Let's give even greater meaning to this holiday to honor those who have answered our country's call to meet the threat of armed aggression. Let's observe Veterans Day 1974 with a reaffirmation of our pride in America and our unified support of her democratic process.

"Teddy" Roosevelt is quoted as having once said: "Speak Softly — But Carry a Big Stick". This bit of blunt advice has been ignored many times since its utterance by we "Easy Going Americans" and has undoubtedly cost us billions of dollars as well as the lives of many good citizens and soldiers.

We, as Good Americans, should do our utmost to see that "Our Big Stick" is in constant readiness so that the lives of all those brave men who died to preserve our freedom, will not have been in vain!
