



## "SESQUI" Profit To Exceed \$7,500 !!

Tuesday evening, November 12, 1974, several members of the "Sesqui - Centennial" Executive Committee met at the home of "Jim" Mulholland for a regular business meeting.

Harold Rice, Headquarters Chairman, gave a report on the souvenir items from Headquarters that are still on hand. Some History Books and Pens have been donated to patients in some of the Nursing Homes in Wellsville. Several members of the Committee purchased some coins, pens and other items at the meeting as "Ricey" just happened to have some of these items with him.

Phil Fitch volunteered to take pens, bronze coins and plate hangers to sell at the Market Basket for the Committee. These items are all "bargain priced" and would make nice "stocking stuffers" for the forth-coming holidays.

After December 1st Harold Rice will make an inventory of the remaining merchandise and ask for bids to clear everything out.

The "Sesqui" Committee thanks the Town of Andover for their contribution of \$1,000 towards the expenses for the "Sesqui-Centennial" Celebration as well as the Village of Andover for their help via labor, electric wiring, street cleaning, and other helpful activities. Honorary Participation Certificates will be presented to both the Town and Village for their offices.

Several History Book ads and listings have not been paid for so-o-o, please step forward and do so.

Reid Mattison then gave his preliminary Financial Report which appears on the back page of this week's edition of the Andover News with every one very happy with the results reported.

Committee Members discussed the disposition of the funds that were netted from the Celebration which will amount to more than \$7,500 when all souvenir merchandise is disposed of. A motion was made and carried that monies must go to a Medical Building in Andover - or it must be re-allocated for another purpose. An Attorney will be consulted to draw up an appropriate contract of papers to state the requirements of the "Sesqui" Committee and to place the money in trust until such time as actual use seems imminent.

The Headquarters sign which was placed on the old Andover Town Hall Building and which was given to us by Whitesville, will be offered to Bolivar in 1975 and to Greenwood in 1976 for their use. Two of the Street Banners will be given to the Andover "Bi-Centennial" Committee for their use in 1976 with the 3rd one being sold to an individual who shall make it available for use by that Committee at that time.

A report was made on participation shares that were turned in for redemption amounting to only \$155, representing only four certificates. Purchasers of participation shares are to be congratulated on their wonderful co-operation which helped make the Celebration such a huge success.

A final financial report will be given when all "Sesqui" matters and business has been completed which will probably be after the first of the year.

## Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday evening, November 11, 1974 at 7:30. Those present: James Bliss, Mayor; Robert Baker, Paul Hyland and Avery Mead and Michael Brace, Trustees; and Robert Costello, Supt. of Public Works.

Minutes of the regular meeting held October 14th were read and approved on a motion made by Robert Baker and seconded by Paul Hyland. Carried.

Minutes of the Special Meeting held October 29th were read and approved on a motion made by Avery Mead and seconded by Robert Baker. Carried.

Moved by Robert Baker and seconded by Avery Mead, to accept the resignation of Max Graves from the Planning Board. Carried. Supt. Robert Costello reported that the water lines have been flushed on Water St. and they are now in the process of installing a new electric line on Baker St.

The Village has received a check in the amount of \$6,205.26, for flood reimbursement from the Division of Military and Naval Affairs, and will receive another check for \$2,200.00 in the near future, according to the Department of Civil Defense.

Robert Baker moved, seconded by Paul Hyland for the Village Electric Department to issue bonds in the amount of \$100,000 for construction of the new sub-station and to invest this money in certificates of deposit, until needed. Carried.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Paul Hyland to issue a building permit to Charles Joyce to construct a house on his lot on Baker St.

The Clerk was authorized to purchase a new typing stand from Mason's at a cost of \$59.50.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Paul Hyland to accept the following Police Report for the month of October. Complaints - 8; Investigations - 8; Misc. ## Veterans News

**LISTEN VETERAN COMMISSARY AND EXCHANGE PRIVILEGES:** Honorably discharged veterans of the uniformed services with 100 percent service-connected disability, their dependents and unmarried widows are entitled to unlimited commissary and exchange privileges. Honorable discharged veterans of the uniformed services when hospitalized where facilities are available are also entitled to unlimited commissary and exchange privileges.

**GOVERNMENT LIFE INSURANCE-PREMIUM WAIVERS:** Many veterans still holding their Government Life Insurance and who become totally disabled may be entitled to a waiver of premiums. In order for a veteran to be eligible for a premium waiver he must have a total disability commencing prior to his 65th birthday, and the disability must continue for at least six consecutive months. Once a policy-holder's right to such waiver is established, he will not be required to pay any premiums so long as he remains totally disabled. The premium-waiver will not cause any reduction in the face amount of the policy, nor will there be any interruption in the payment of dividends on participating policies while the premium-waiver is in effect. Also, if premiums on a term policy are being waived at the time it is converted to a permanent plan, the premiums will be waived on the converted policy as well. Information on premium-waiver possibilities as well as complete information on all aspects of G.I. Life Insurance may be obtained at the Division of Veterans Affairs Counseling Center at the Municipal Building, Wellsville, N. Y., on Tuesdays and at the City Building 108 Broadway, Hornell on Mondays Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

## "GOD OF CREATION" To Be Shown Nov. 24th At Presbyterian Church

Flowers will bloom and a caterpillar will change into a butterfly in a matter of seconds. The processes are compressed by the time-lapse camera for the motion picture "GOD OF CREATION". Included also are the first color motion pictures of photo-synthesis (the food manufacturing process in plants).

"God Of Creation", produced by Dr. Irwin A. Moon, Director of the Moody Institute of Science in Whittier, California... is one of a series of unique and interesting motion pictures called "Sermons From Science". These unique films were viewed by thousands at the New York World's Fair, Expo '67 at Seattle.

In producing "God Of Creation" the cameraman looked through the world's largest telescopes to see thousands of light years into space to view great nebular, each composed of thousands of solar systems much like our own. Then he peered into a drop of water under a microscope and another "universe" was discovered, a world far more complex than even the whirling galaxies of space.

All of this and more is included in the motion picture "God Of Creation" to be shown Sunday, November 24, at 9:45 A. M., in the Presbyterian Sunday School Room Andover, N. Y.

## School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order November 12, 1974 by the President, Francis Horan. Mr. Jordan and the following Board Members were present: Carl Atwell, William Walker and Mary K. Slade.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve the minutes as read was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and District Treasurer's Reports were read for approval. These reports were moved for approval by Mary K. Slade and seconded by Carl Atwell. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Payrolls for the month of October were read for approval. The gross amount of these was \$44,663.11. Carl Atwell made the motion to approve these and William Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Resolution was passed by 3 votes that the General Fund bills in the amount of \$20,008.36, plus Electric, for October 1974 and Cafeteria \$2,249.68, as certified by Mr. Jordan, be paid. The motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by Marv K. Slade. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria Report was read showing a net profit for the month of October of \$304.76. William Walker made the motion that this report be filed with the minutes, seconded by Carl Atwell, passed by 3 votes of yes.

Motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker, that the President of the Board or Clerk, be authorized to sign the School Tax Return consisting of unpaid taxes plus penalties. Passed by 3 votes of yes. The Clerk of the Board was present and signed the above document.

The Board approved the loaning of \$2,000.00 to Federal Title I until funds are received on this grant. Motion was made by William Walker and seconded by Mary K. Slade, passed by 3 votes of yes.

Condition of accounts report was presented to the Board to be included with the minutes of this meeting.

The results of the bids were read. The Board has accepted the following bids:

- Carl Atwell made the motion and William Walker seconded the motion - passed by 3 votes of yes.

Creation of an additional Art Teaching Assistant position was made at no cost to the school district. Miss Kathleen Mulcahy will be on the job until July 1, 1975. Financing will come thru Federally backed Manpower Funds. Carl Atwell moved and Mary K. Slade seconded. Carried by 3 votes of yes.
