Policy was restated concerning corporal punishment and student supervision at the Greenwood School Board meeting Monday. Jane Anderson, reading teacher, was named to coach girls volleyball. Tom Kumar will coach boys basketball. Varsity and Jayvee An assistant is being sought. Principal Gary Moore discussed Board policy regarding corporal punishment. The Board voted to continue its policy which agrees with the State Law to the extent that a teacher may administer corporal punishment fairly and reasonably. He told the Board that students using the lounge have been permitted to go outdoors when the weather is good. He said there had been no problems.

Authorization was given for the purchase of a new scoreboard in the gym at an estimated cost of about \$900. The present scoreboard is not working perfectly and cannot be repaired, the Board learned. The Board approved the following substitute teachers: Paula Payne, Music; Lynn William, Math and Science; Charles Coughlin, Physical Education for Elementary Grades and Science; and Diane Gurnsey, Elementary Grades.

The Board approved Ron and Jolene Meehan as chaperons for the Senior Class Spring Trip to Washington. Clair and Gloria Tracy will be alternates. The Board voted to make a preliminary request for the same Board of Cooperative Educational Services for 1975-76 school year as in the 1974-75 school year. The Board continued to work on preliminary estimates for renovation to the heating and temperature control system, school clocks, floor tiles and other projects as submitted by the architects. About \$8,800 in unpaid school taxes for the district were turned over to the County Treasurer. Approval was given for a biology class field trip to the College of the Finger Lakes. The Board expressed its appreciation to the Greenwood Central School soccer team and its Coach Tom Kumar for the successful season and will honor the team and coach at a spaghetti dinner Thursday night at the school.

The Greenwood Central School Band Boosters Club, organized recently met at the school Tuesday Nov. 19 at 7:30 p. m. Members of the Color Guard were fitted for their new uniforms which are being assembled by Booster Club members. Other projects will be cleaning and repairing uniforms, serving as chaperons at parades and helping at practices.

There are forty members in the Junior Band composed of elementary students. The Junior and Senior Band will sell packaged popcorn in January to raise funds for the Color Guard uniforms. A pop-rock group in the Senior Band has been formed. The school recently purchased a bass guitar, a rhythm guitar and an amplifier. The Band has added an organ and drums. The new group expects to perform at the Christmas program. Preparations and rehearsals began October 21 for the musical "Winnie The Pooh" which will be presented December 13. Much of the work is done during the musical mini-course. The Senior Band participated in the half-time activities at Mansfield College Homecoming football game.

Whitesville had a disastrous fire Sunday, November 9 when seven buildings were destroyed. Whitesville's water supply in their reservoir was low, so they called Andover and Wellsville for assistance. In less than 40 minutes the Andover Brockway LaFrance pumper had a stream of water on the burning buildings. Andover arrived before the Wellsville Firemen and had the fire so under control before the Wellsville boys reached the scene, that they did not start their pump.

The big dam across the Genesee River at the foot of Schuyler Street in Belmont, built by the State this past summer for the purpose of protecting the State Highway and Greenwich Street, has been completed and tools and machinery removed to another job. The cost of the completed work to the State will be approximately \$50,000. The dam was put to a severe test a short time after its completion when a 36 hour rain fell and the water rose to flood tide. The dam is functioning properly.

News From Albany

The Office of Assemblyman James L. Emery (R-Genesee) announced his schedule for the week beginning November 25, 1974, as follows:

Monday - November 25 - The Assemblyman will begin a tour of active duty with the United States Air Force Reserve, in which he holds the rank of Lt. Col. He will be on this active duty through December 6th.

Albany - Assemblyman James L. Emery said that he was pleased to note a reported savings of \$130,000 as a result of his legislation which integrated snowmobile and motor boat licensing in the Department of Motor Vehicles operation.

Governor Wilson recently announced more than a million dollars in state savings due to a number of departmental automation and consolidation undertakings and key among these was the \$130,000 savings because of the Emery bill.

The consolidation move (which was Chapter 839 of the Laws of 1973) transferred the licensing registration process for snowmobiles and motor boats from the Office of Parks and Recreation to the State Motor Vehicles Department. The transfer became effective in October of 1973.

The purpose of the move, according to Emery, was to save duplication of processing and equipment by the two departments. At the same time, it enabled owners of snowmobiles and motorboats to register them at their local County Clerks Office or Motor Vehicle Department branch, often at the same time they renew registration on their cars.

In order to compensate for the handling of this extra workload, County Clerk's throughout the state receive 50 cents from each motorboat and snowmobile registration fee. However, there was no change in the registration fee itself to the owners and no charge in the registration process.

"In these inflationary times when those of us in government must do everything possible to effect savings," Emery said, "it is heartening to know that this plan has indeed brought results."

The Assembly Deputy Majority Leader continued: "If we were able to find over a million dollars in savings by tightening some of the bureaucratic functioning of state government, I am sure we can do even better in the future. In the transfer of the licensing process of motorboats and snowmobiles, which did meet with some resistance when it was first proposed, we have not only caused the state to save some money but I think the general opinion is that we have made this process easier for the owner of such vehicles.
